## **One Day Class "Introduction to the Watchmakers Lathe"**

The One Day Class on March 29<sup>th</sup> will be devoted to "The Introduction to the Watchmakers Lathe" The class will be devoted to the proper maintenance of the lathe, cleaning it, identifying its various parts, aligning work pieces, filing and elementary hand turning. Participants should bring a lathe, if they have one, with a motor, a series of collets or chucks to hold up to 1/4" stock, a graver, a "T" rest, some sort of magnification (3X will do, up to 10X), a sharpening stone (medium to fine), safety glasses, a micrometer ( manual or digital), a fine mill file, and any other tools they think they might need. This class is for beginners; only the primary focus will be on those skills needed to do simple lathe turnings and will be followed with more complex lathe turning class at a later date. The last hour of the class will be "Open Bench" where any participant who has a problem with any type of watch or clock may bring it to the class and receive suggestions or the assistance needed to solve that problem. It would help if the participant bringing a watch or clock to the Open Bench session would notify the Instructor Dave Gorrell beforehand. The Class fee is still only \$10.00.

## Bench Tips:

Recently I ran into two problems that made me painfully aware of a growing problem in the clock and watch repair industry. Both problems involved repairing clocks, but I am sure that the same dilemma pertains to watchmakers as well. The first problem involved a French carriage clock that had a broken click spring. Unfortunately it was a very small movement and I couldn't find a replacement part for it in any of the standard parts catalogs. The only solution seemed to be to make it. But before I embarked on a rather lengthy project I thought, "what about the French Parts suppliers". If anyone ought to have them it would be the French. So off to the computer I went. Typed in French Clock Parts Suppliers. The results, NOTHING. O.K. where do I go from here? Well what about looking for Suppliers that advertised in some of the French clock periodicals? I found some very interesting sites with plenty of Clock dealers and a great many articles concerning French clocks. Unfortunately my French is rather limited. No, make that nonexistent. So after several long periods of time going back and forth between the articles and the "Online translating Site" I found, again, NOTHING. So, since I have, up to this point, spent more time on the Internet than it would have taken me to just take some stock and make a new one, which I did, and the repaired clock left the shop with a happy customer. The second problem also involved a clock repair. A customer had a very nice antique grandfather clock which needed a good cleaning and the hour hand had been broken at some time in the distant past. The customer asked if the hour hand could be repaired, after looking it over closely I determined that it wouldn't be too hard to solder a piece of brass to fill in the missing parts and then regild the entire hand so that it matched the perfectly intact minute hand. After clamping the hour hand down to the soldering block in every place possible I applied a small amount of heat. In stark horror I watched the hand disappear into a blob of some nondescript metal. After several rather unprintable mutterings, (No, make that a somewhat stifled profane primal scream.) I thought that it would be simple to look for a reasonable replacement. After perusing the standard parts catalogs I found nothing that was even close. So remembering my adventures in the overseas catalogs, I reluctantly went back to the Internet. Since I subscribe to Clocks and I am a member of the British Horological Institute I thought this can't be too difficult. Surely there ought to be something that would match the original minute hand and could be used. How wrong I was, there was a nice selection of hands for tall case clocks in several of the catalogs I found, but unfortunately nothing anywhere near what I needed. So not to be dissuaded by past failure I decided to give the Continental Parts suppliers another chance. The results, unfortunately were the same. So here again, after wasting a good deal of time, I find myself cutting out the hand myself. The good part of this story is that I have located several sources of clock parts and I have listed them below. Unfortunately most of them carry the same standard list of parts and you will be just as frustrated as I was in locating the odd or unusual pieces. Anyone who knows of other sources please let me know and I will gladly pass them on so everyone can use them.

## The Largest Clock in the World

Where do you think you would find the largest clock in the world? England, Germany, the United States? In fact none of these are correct. Here again we are talking about the largest clock face in the world. As many a shocked clock owner or repairperson would attest, the size of the clock face is often not even remotely related to the size of the clock movement behind it. Often very large dials or clock faces are in front of relatively small clock movements. The correct answer to our original question is Saudi Arabia. The Abraj Al Bait Clock is located in the Royal Hotel Clock Tower in Mecca. This clock not only has the world's largest dial but it is also in the world's tallest clock tower. The clock has four faces, each one is 43 meters ( 141 feet) in diameter. Each face is mounted 530 meters or 1,740 feet above the ground. The four faces are visible to the naked eye from a distance of 25 km (16 miles) away. Each dial is illuminated with 2 million L.E.D. lights. At each corner of the dial there is a golden dome illuminated with 21,000 green and white lights that flash five times a day. This is a reminder signaling the five times a devout Muslim must pray each day. This flashing light is visible for a distance of 30 km or 19 miles. The clock faces themselves are made up of 98 million pieces of mosaic glass and each one bears the Saudi coat of arms. The hour hand is 17 meters (56 feet) long, the minute hand is 27 meters or 72 feet long. The clock was designed by the German architect Mahmond Bodo Rasch and built by the German firm of Perrot GmbH & Co. KG Turmuhren und Lauteanlager. Construction on this project began in 2004, and took eight years until it opened in 2012.
