HISTORY OF GREAT LAKES CHAPTER #6

National Association of Watch and Clock Collectors, Inc.

Prologue - The National Organization

The National Association of Watch and Clock Collectors was established during the last half of 1943 through the efforts of L.D. Stallcup and Jesse E. Coleman of Nashville, Tennessee, and Robert Franks of Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania. Mr. Stallcup, as "Secretary Pro-Tem" sent four pages of material to various persons urging them to become members in THE WATCH COLLECTOR'S CLUB. This mailing was later designated as Bulletin No. 1.

A second mailing went out on November 8, 1943 advising recipients that the name of the new organization had been changed to THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF WATCH AND CLOCK COLLECTORS in response to numerous requests. The mailing included a membership list as of November 7, 1943; there were 52 names on the list, but none from Michigan. Also mentioned was the formation of a Philadelphia Chapter of the NAWCC, which had its first meeting on November 1, 1943. This mailing was later designated as Bulletin No. 2.

* * * * * * * * * * *

During the next two years the N.A. of W. and C.C. (as it was then abbreviated) proceeded to get itself organized. The first elections were held by mail in December, 1943 (Bulletin No. 3), with results published in February, 1944 (Bulletin No. 4).

The first Annual Meeting was held October 28, 1944 at the Engineer's Club in Philadelphia, with 27 members present. A "working draft" of a Constitution and By-Laws was prepared by a committee during the meeting. After incorporating revisions submitted by the membership, an "official draft" was published in August, 1945 (Bulletin No. 8). This draft, with some further changes, was approved at the second Annual Meeting (also in Philadelphia) November 16-17, 1945.

* * * * * * * * * *

Bulletin No. 11 (June, 1946) included a complete membership roster. By then, there were 283 members, including 4 from Michigan. Also included on this roster were such now-familiar names as Dana Blackwell, Henry Fried and James Gibbs, each of whom was the first recipient, in 1986, of a special NAWCC award named after him.

The roster of Michigan members continued to grow. Bulletin No. 24 (July 1948) announced that a Michigan Chapter at Detroit had been formed on May 2, 1948 at Al Scott's home, and published a list of charter members. This was the sixth Chapter to be formed, coming after Philadelphia, New York, Chicago, Southern California and San Francisco.

HISTORY OF GREAT LAKES CHAPTER #6, NAWCC

The Early Years: 1948-1952

"In the beginning.....

.....there was Alfred C. Scott."

Any history of the Great Lakes Chapter naturally starts when Al Scott (NAWCC #274) and Art Molnar (NAWCC #275) joined the NAWCC in 1946. The founding meeting was held at Al Scott's home in Grosse Pointe on May 2, 1948 and the new chapter was reported in Bulletin No. 24 (June, 1948) as the MICHIGAN CHAPTER. A slate of officers was elected at the meeting; see the facing page for a list of charter members.

The second chapter meeting was held June 12, 1948 at the homes of Ivan Belknap and J.A. Van Egmond, who were neighbors on Sunderland Rd. in Detroit. Royal J. Foote was added to the original slate of officers as Publicity Chairman; in this capacity, he reported on chapter meetings to the Bulletin Editor, using the title of Assistant Secretary.

There were 24 meetings held during the 1948-1952 period. Most of the meetings were held in members' homes; the men would gather in basement workshops or in a "clock room" to conduct business and to discuss their hobby, while the women would enjoy a social hour in the parlor. Meetings often included a short talk on a subject of particular interest to the members, and sometimes ended with a brief auction. Auction items were donated by members, with the proceeds going to offset chapter expenses; no dues or fees were collected. Finally, the men and women would join their hosts for light refreshments before departing.

The first annual chapter picnic meeting was held at Cliff Dabney's place in Almont on September 10, 1949. The first chapter dinner meeting was held March 18, 1950 at the Dearborn Inn; the chapter was renamed DETROIT CHAPTER #6.

On May 19-20, 1950 DETROIT CHAPTER #6 hosted the Sixth Annual Meeting of the NAWCC, with Royal G. Foote acting as General Chairman. The meeting was held at the Dearborn Inn, with 93 members and guests in attendance. One of the main attractions of the Dearborn Inn's location was its proximity to the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village; a "Timepiece Tour" was included in the meeting's agenda.

On the business side of the 1950 Annual Meeting, Al Scott was appointed to the NAWCC's Council; he had already been active in National affairs as a member of several committees and as Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee.

At a meeting held at the Dearborn Inn on April 12, 1952, the chapter was renamed GREAT LAKES CHAPTER #6 in recognition of the growing number of members resident in Northern Ohio and in other locations outside Detroit. A chapter roster dated September 15, 1952 shows that it had grown from the original 17 charter members to 57 members before the end of 1952.

HISTORY OF GREAT LAKES CHAPTER #6, NAWCC

1953-1960

At various times during the 1950's, chapter members Al Scott, Tom Michels and Tom Crowley, Jr. served on National committees. Al Scott's term as Director ended in 1953, but another chapter member, NAWCC charter member Harry S. Blaine (NAWCC #5) of Toledo, OH was elected as Director for the 1953-1957 term. In 1957, Al Scott was elected NAWCC First Vice President; he served as National President 1959-1961.

As chapter membership continued to increase, it became more difficult to hold meetings in members' homes; a great number of alternative formats were explored. The annual picnic continued to be popular. Also popular were the late afternoon tours of Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village, followed by dinner at the Dearborn Inn or Clinton Inn. Tom Michels led the earlier tours; later in the 1950's, Bill Distin and/or Bob Cheyne served as host. Free entrance to the Museum and Village, courtesy of the Edison Institute, was a feature of these meetings.

Printing and mailing costs now exceeded \$50 per year, and chapter secretaries were no longer willing to absorb these costs. There were no chapter dues, and the principal source of funds continued to be the auctions held at most meetings, with Don Lance serving as auctioneer. Members were now paid 75% of the selling price of items they brought to the auction, with the chapter retaining a 25% fee. By 1956, the cost of a dinner meeting had increased to the \$3-\$4 range; money was collected at the door as members and guests arrived. If the weather was inclement and members who had reserved didn't show up, the chapter had to pay the difference. At times, it became necessary for Treasurer/Auctioneer Don Lance to "pass the hat" before he could pay for the evening's dinner.

Great Lakes Chapter hosted its second NAWCC Annual Meeting in 1957, again at the Dearborn Inn, with 273 members and guests in attendance. As in 1950, the featured attractions of the meeting were the watch and clock collections on display at Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village; a special 30-day display of members' clocks was also on exhibit. Another attraction was the mart, housed at the Dearborn Inn. Total cost of the meeting was \$20, including two lunches and two dinners.

An annual picnic meeting at Van and Julie Belknap's became an "institution" after the first such meeting in 1957; Van and Julie's famous "Iron Ore Dessert" was featured in Bull. No. 77 (Dec. 1958).

A series of stag "Workshop" meetings was instituted in 1959 to supplement the "regular" meetings. These were popular with the 15-20 attendees (versus 40-60 at "regular" meetings).

Indiana Chapter #18 started its "Chapter Activities" article printed in Bull. #71 (Dec. 1957) with the statement: "Indiana Chapter was host to the first regional NAWCC Conference held Saturday and Sunday, October 5-6, at the Purdue University Student Union Building, West Lafayette, Indiana." In addition to National President Walter Roberts and the two National Vice Presidents, six presidents of chapters in the midwest were among the participants. This "Mid-America Conference at Purdue" appears to have been the first of the NAWCC's Regionals.

1961-1969

During the 1960's, all past presidents of the National organization continued to serve on Council as Directors. After Al Scott completed his term as President in 1961, he remained on Council until 1969, when the By-Laws were changed. Chapter member Ivan Belknap was elected a National Director for the 1965-1969 term, giving the chapter double representation on Council. Toward the end of the decade, Don Lance was appointed to the Membership Committee.

The chapter's late October or early November meetings from 1959 through 1963 were held at the facilities of Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village and followed a similar pattern. Members would meet at about 3:30 PM on Saturday for a tour of the watch and clock collections led by Bill Distin; later, a dinner would be served at the Clinton Inn. In 1963, attendance reached 123 members and their guests, with 42 of these being from other chapters.

The Early Regionals

In 1964, the format of the fall meeting changed in several important ways. For the first time, the meeting started on Saturday morning, and dinner was served in Lovett Hall instead of the Clinton Inn. The mart started at noon, rather than later in the day. National President Urban Thielman was an invited guest. Also for the first time, the meeting continued on Sunday, when the homes of five chapter members were open for tours of the owners' collections. And the meeting's registration badge permitted free entrance to the Museum and Village on both Saturday and Sunday, courtesy of the Edison Institute. The charge for this FIRST ANNUAL GREAT LAKES REGIONAL, including banquet, was \$4.50. No charge for mart tables!

Except for an earlier opening of the mart, this meeting format continued basically unchanged through 1971, when the mart portion of the meeting outgrew the Education Building's space.

In 1966, the meeting featured a tribute to Al Scott by National President Bill Wadleigh, Jr., whose remarks were printed in Bulletin #125 (Dec. 1966). This talk was followed by the first of George Peterson's "Behind the Dial" slide presentations, still available from the NAWCC Library.

The 1968 meeting marked the 20th anniversary of the chapter's founding. Special recognition was given to the chapter's Charter Members who were still active: Bill Ashdowne, Van Belknap, Royal Foote and Al Scott. All had hosted many chapter affairs in their homes; Van Belknap had served as General Chairman of all the early Regionals and was now a National Director, and Al Scott had "done it all".

For the first time, income from the 1968 Regional exceeded expenses. The chapter invested this surplus in an Ithaca Parlor Calendar Clock, which was later presented to the Edison Institute. In this small way, the chapter was able to express its appreciation for the free use of the Museum and Village during the first 20 years of the chapter's existence.

1970-1976

An era ended with the passing of Alfred C. Scott on February 2, 1970. Final tributes were made at the 1970 Regional by National President Willard Andrews and other dignitaries. Attendance at this Regional exceeded 800; the figure would double by 1976.

Van Belknap was now the "dean" of the chapter and, in February of 1970, wrote a letter to the chapter to let newer members know HOW IT'S BEEN DONE---AND WHO DID IT (Appendix I).

The first of the chapter's December dinner meetings at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial was held in 1970; these meetings have been a fixture on the chapter's schedule ever since. And the series of annual picnic meetings that had started in 1949 ended in 1971 with a picnic at the Bristol family's Brookwood Fruit Farm in Almont.

Chapter President Bill Distin was elected a National Director for the 1971-1975 term; he also served on the Museum Committee until 1976.

A major change in the Regional format occurred in 1972, when the mart was moved from the Education Building at Greenfield Village to the Dearborn Youth Center. The mart was now open from 6 to 10 PM on Friday as well as all day Saturday. Except for 1973, the Regional banquet continued to be held at Lovett Hall until 1980. And the Regional badge continued to permit free entry to Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village on all three days of the Regional, usually with tours led by Bob Cheyne. Radio star Bud Guest entertained members and guests with his "Sunny Side of the Street" soliloquys after the Regional banquets in 1972, 1974 and 1976.

A new Chapter Constitution and By-Laws was written during 1974 by a Charter Committee made up of Chairman Harold Myler and members Joe Brincat, Don Lance and Rocky Romeo. After review by Council at its February 3, 1975 meeting, it was mailed to chapter members with a ballot for approval. A major change, effective at the end of 1975, was to reduce terms of office from two years to one year. Council would now include the four officers, the immediate past president, and four directors.

Morley and Luella Witmer celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary during the 1974 Regional and were honored for their many contributions to horology and to the chapter. The Witmers' home was on the Sunday "open house" list eleven times during the 1964 through 1976 period, when this was a popular feature of the Regional meetings. Morley had coached many chapter members in clock repair skills, and Luella seemed to always be present whenever help was needed with hospitality matters.

The success of the Regional meetings during this period resulted in an affluence unknown during the early years of the chapter. It was now possible to bring in renowned out-of-town speakers for chapter meetings; names such as Dana Blackwell, Ken Roberts, Chris Bailey and Henry Fried turned into real-life people. And the chapter was now able to regularly contribute clocks and/or funds in support of selected horological activities and museums (Appendix III).

1977-1982

The chapter lost two of its Past Presidents in 1975, when Van Belknap retired to Florida and Don Brown was transferred to Wisconsin. Luella Witmer became Chapter Historian after Van's departure, and maintained the chaptef's photo albums and newspaper clipping files until recently, when Ted and Dee Anderson took on this responsibility. Van Belknap's passing was reported in Bulletin #125 (Dec. 1981); he is believed to have been the chapter's last surviving Charter Member.

Early in 1976, Council voted to appoint a Corresponding Secretary; it would be a non-voting position that would pay a small stipend. The first person to take the the job was Jo Burt; however, when husband Harry resigned as Secretary in mid-1976, Jo also resigned. Mary Wolleson was then appointed to the position, which she held through 1981, after which she was replaced by Denny Grosse.

In 1977, the chapter's Constitution and By-Laws were amended to extend the term of Directors from one year to two years. Plans for hosting the NAWCC's 1981 National Convention were also initiated early in 1977; Mel Anderson volunteered to act as General Chairman. A formal proposal was presented to National and approved later in the year.

Under the chairmanship of Jim Mehrer, a chapter Restoration Committee took on the task of restoring an Ives Triple Decker shelf clock for the Henry Ford Museum. The restored clock was presented to Colonel Edward Gilbert, Chief Conservator for the Museum, at the chapter's May 15, 1977 meeting held in Lovett Hall. Jim also gave a slide presentation detailing the restoration process, the cost of which had been paid for by the chapter.

From 1975 onwards, Workshops and Exhibits became an increasingly important part of the Regional meeting format. In addition, the registration "package" now included a reprint of late 19th or early 20th century clock catalogs. The reprints were produced in a cooperative venture with Chris Bailey, then Managing Director of the American Watch and Clock Museum in Bristol, CT, who was commissioned to research and write the history of a particular clock company, which was then printed at the end of the catalog. To the extent possible, the subject of the Exhibit was coordinated with the subject chosen for the catalog (Appendix II).

The Regional mart had outgrown the Dearborn Youth Center's available space, but Regional meetings continued to be held there through 1979. In 1980, the venue was changed to the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Dearborn. This was the largest Great Lakes Regional ever, with over 1800 members and guests in attendance.

Owen (Harry) Burt was elected a National Director for the 1979-1983 term; he also served on the Ways and Means Committee, becoming Chairman in 1981. Owen also served on the Convention Committee, Jo Burt on the Membership and Program Committee, Bill Haggerty on the Awards Committee and Tim White on the Craft Contest Committee.

The chapter hosted the Thirty Seventh National Convention at the Detroit Plaza (now Westin) Hotel in Detroit's new Renaissance Center in June of 1981. One of the many highlights was Ted Anderson's First Place finish in the Craft Contest, won with a beautiful hand-made fusee skeleton clock.

Chapter members became more involved with local museums during the 1980's. This involvement had started in 1982 when Chapter President Tom Seymour contacted the Detroit and Dearborn Historical Museums to ask how the chapter could assist with their horological collections. The responses were both prompt and positive.

Bill Ellison became the liaison with the Detroit Historical Museums; the chapter organized an exhibit of members' clocks in connection with the official presentation of the Meier clock on July 15, 1982. The restoration of the Meier clock and the design and installation of an electric winding mechanism became a chapter project for the next several years (Bull. #264, Feb. 1990), while cataloging and restoration of the remainder of the collections continued.

Peggy Timlin acted as the liaison with the Dearborn Historical Museums, where the clock and watch collections were restored by chapter members in 1983 and 1984. The restored clocks were the subject of a special exhibit at the McFadden-Ross House from Sept. 1 through Nov. 30, 1984.

These restoration projects were completed at no cost to the museums. Members would sign out artifacts for restoration at their homes; out-of-pocket costs were absorbed by the chapter. Later in the decade, a similar project was initiated at Meadowbrook Hall in Rochester, with Joe Kuechle as the chapter liaison person. Meanwhile, Bill Haggerty was working as a volunteer at Henry Ford Museum, helping to maintain the clocks on exhibit.

These cataloging and restoration projects, and the chapter's support of horological museums by gifts of cash or clocks (Appendix III), were significant factors in the award to Great Lakes Chapter #6 of the first "Chapter of the Year" award in 1986 (Bull. #244, Oct. 1966).

On the National scene, Owen Burt was elected First Vice President for the 1983-1985 term, during which he also chaired the Convention Committee, while Jo Burt chaired the Membership and Publication Committee. Owen served as National President for the 1985-1987 term; Jo chaired the Ways and Means Committee 1985-1989. Jo Burt and Jim West were elected National Directors for the 1989-1993 term; Jim is also a member of the Seminar and Museum Acquisition Committees.

The Seventh Annual National Seminar was held October 23-25, 1986 at the Dearborn Inn, with Burck Grosse as General Chairman. When Burck retired and he and Denny moved to Florida in mid-1987, Denny's tenure as Corresponding Secretary came to an end. Maggie Priestaf stepped in to handle the balance of the Regional paperwork, after which Agnes Voss became Denny's permanent replacement.

In 1987, a new chapter project was initiated to catalog the clock collections of Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village, with Jim West as liaison. With Gerry Boyd's assistance, the clock catalog was completed early in 1990, and work on the much larger watch collection has begun.

Although attendance at both regional and chapter meetings declined during this period, there was no lack of enthusiasm among those who continued to participate. Gary James and Jack Linahan seemed to alternate as co-chairman of the regional mart committee, while Judy James tended to hospitality.

THE GREAT LAKES CHAPTER #6 February 5, 1970 HOW IT'S BEEN DONE---AND WHO DID IT

Dear fellow member:

Over the years the Great Lakes Chapter has grown like Topsey. A nucleus of old and faithful members have carried on through good times and bad and generally speaking have done a good job. The last few years have brought in a large number of new members and the size of the Chapter and the resulting meetings have brought new problems for all of us. In an effort to bring the new members up to date on the Chapter and the way it has been run, the following is dedicated.

The Detroit Chapter was chartered in May of 1948 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A.C. Scott with about fifteen members. It was dedicated to our mutual hobby in an effort to increase our knowledge and skills and above all to have a good time. We have spent a great deal of effort to preserve the 'fun' aspect and not allow our project to flounder on technical projects. We have resisted all efforts to force us into a pattern conceived by others and will continue to do so. We owe allegiance to the National Association and have always followed the basic rules laid out in the bylaws and constitution. The name of the Chapter was changed a few years after its founding, to the Michigan Chapter. This lasted for a few years and it was again changed to the Great Lakes Chapter. The National assigned us #6 to indicate our place in the order of Chapter formations.

The ex-presidents of the Chapter were called upon to be the nominating committee in that it was felt that they, above all, knew who would make good officers. This worked out so well that they have become an unofficial board of directors, if and when such are needed. As a general rule officers progress through the different offices until they become president. Following that they become one of the ex-presidents and as such are always included in any work details that come along. Up to now there has never been any president re-elected to that office. While there has never been any Chapter ruling to cover this, we feel that our method will enable a greater number of members to serve the Chapter.

We have been against dues in any form as a means of securing money to cover expenses. Dues would mean someone would have to record and collect them. Such action often causes hard feelings and besides, it wanders from our 'fun' methods of operation. For years we passed the hat whenever we were in need of money and this kept us solvent. Chapter members used to donate a clock or some other horological item to be auctioned with the proceeds going to the Chapter. Our basic expenses are mailing the notices out to the members. We use a regular business service to take care of this detail. Any new member in our area is automatically put on the list.

We have tried many ways to ascertain the degree of interest on the part of the membership. We have sent out letters asking if they were interested in coming to the meetings as well as requesting suggestions as to meetings, subjects, etc. We included postage paid cards for answers and received replies from some twenty-five percent of the members. With a greater number attending the meetings we are being forced into using meeting places for which we have to pay rent. It will be necessary to assess some amount to cover this cost. With present mailing costs we pay around fifteen cents for each one; multiply that by four hundred and you soon reach financial problems. We are all glad to send everyone who is interested a notice; we would just like to eliminate the others.

HOW IT'S BEEN DONE---AND WHO DID IT PAGE II

Meetings are strictly on an informal basis. Long ago we found that reading minutes of the previous meeting was an unnecessary chore. No one listened and only the fans of the parliamentary system enjoyed it. Tom Crowley started the system of writing up the minutes for the last meeting and included them in the announcement for the next meeting. We now have nearly one hundred percent of the members reading the minutes. Treasury reports would be included if we ever had enough money to write about. For those who wonder, we have given up auctions at the meetings, for it proved a waste of time. All meetings have provisions for display and Mart items. The officers are working hard to have equal numbers of meetings on each side of the city. This is difficult due to the scarcity of good meeting places and you may be sure that any help you can give the officers on this problem will help all of us. Regular meetings are those wherein the ladies are welcomed. We also have work shop meetings for members only, due to limited space, and the how-to-do-it nature of the meetings.

You will derive a great deal more pleasure from your hobby if you attend meetings. Other members often have an odd part you need badly as well as experience in doing some of the work. Another fascinating thing is attending other Chapters' meetings. You meet more wonderful folks and you learn more about clocks and values than is possible in any other way. Prices vary in different sections of the country from time to time, and the knowledge gained through visits to other Chapters help in determining where to sell valuable clocks and watches. Another plus is that such visits result in more Chapter members coming to our Regional and other meetings.

Nearly every election year the Chapter receives inquiries as to why only one candidate for each office is offered by the nominating committee, and why not throw the nominations open on the floor of a meeting. The answer is, nearly all of the officers put in a lot of work on Chapter activities and it is almost impossible to come up with more than one person suitable and willing for each office. Write-in candidates are welcome and all of the members of the nominating committee would be delighted to receive suggestions at any time. They would gladly offer more candidates for elections if they were available.

In conclusion, it is our hope that this will help clarify the operation of your Great Lakes Chapter. Should you have any other questions please feel free to ask any of the officers. We can assure you that they will welcome any constructive criticism and, above all, offers to help in the work of the Chapter. Please remember we can't be of help if you fail to tell us what you would like in the different phases of Chapter activity.

The chapter's archives, and particularly its financial records, are not complete for all years. To the extent possible, the listings in this Appendix have been extracted from financial records (e.g., cancelled checks) and correspondence (e.g., "thank you" notes from recipients). Where this type of record was not available in the archives, the data have been derived from meeting minutes and newsletters; since these sources represent approvals and authorizations rather than actual expenditures, some errors may have resulted. Also, since contributions are approved by Council late in the year, donee records may indicate receipt of contributions in the year following their authorization.
