



#### CLOCK FEVER

and Associated Cardiac Effects

Let me preface this story by saying that I am not usually laid low by clock fever. After collecting for nearly 25 years I have mellowed and I don't let a clock grab me by the collar like I once did. But recently I looked at a clock that "turned me on" like none I have ever seen.

I answered an ad on a master clock that interested me, a Cincinnati Time Recorder Co. special with an impulse dial to go with it. I met its owner and immediately found him to be quite an interesting person. He did make me a little uncomfortable though, being a bit on the nervous side--talking at an accelerated rate that sometimes exceeded the intake capability of my brain!

We moved on to the den where the clock resided, and at first sight my heart began beating with excitement. This feeling actually worried me, since my heart has not been all that reliable in the last few years! The clock was in nice shape and was all that I had anticipated, but not the type of piece to warrant a feeling like I had just unearthed a buried treasure.

I was then escorted to the other end of the house where the slave was ably demonstrated. My heart returned to normal as quickly as it had departed, and after a few more minutes I left with the promise to call back in a few days.

I'll have to admit a couple of things-first, I liked the clock but didn't feel
like it was the right time to buy it, and
second, I was perplexed about why that

clock had affected me so. The more I thought about it, the more I wanted to see that darned clock again. So instead of making a token phone call to thank the owner for showing me his clock. I arranged to take a second look. The only problem was I would have to wait a couple of days to accommodate the schedule of my friend who explained he was in the middle of a great project that he could not put aside. So I chomped on the bit for a day or so. That extra time to think did clear my head, though, and as I drove towards my friend's house I thought again that perhaps I would just take a quick last look and depart. I wasn't ready. after all, to spend that kind of money now anyway.

When I knocked on the door, I was greeted by my talkative friend who said he had just finished a great invention. An inventor. huh? That coincided with my earlier thoughts of his rather hyperkinetic tendencies! He led me to his hobby room, where the workbench was a mass of wires, small parts, and miscellaneous hardware. His 15 minute explanation of what he had just created didn't really enlighten me. I just made a few mental notes about the basic personality of an electronics nut. Then, as we entered the den and the clock came into view it happened again! My heart began throbbing at an alarming rate! I took a look in the bottom of the case and noticed an unusual array of wires and circuits that didn't at all look like original impulse producing circuitry. With my heart beating like it was, I stonned to think about what to do next. Was this

an advanced, uncontrollable case of clock fever? Or was the old ticker just giving me more problems? And then I began to piece this whole thing together. I asked what he had put in the bottom of the clock case, (presumably to actuate the dial in the other room). He went into a totally over-my-head dissertation on this wireless transmitter that actuates the slave. After gently bringing him down to my level of understanding, I discovered that this transmitter was strong enough to foul up the pacemaker that I had been wearing for the last three years. I left the den and just as suddenly my heart returned to normal. Now it was my turn to explain what I had just gone through. I can still hear his laughter. In 1953, the Board of Public Works in Seattle, Washington recommended to the city council that all street clocks be removed. A strong fight ensued, led by the local chapters, NAWCC and others. The fight was long and bitter, but victory came in 1980 when the remaining ten street clocks were declared historical landmarks. The battle was won, but the war went on.

The Seattle City Council passed a resolution, and eventually a city ordinance requiring the clocks to keep accurate time. All is quiet along Pike Street in Seattle, except for the ticking of some grand old pieces from another day.

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Filippo Brunelleschi was a famous architect in Renaissance Italy. One of his feats, a tough one at that time, was to design the coupla over the Santa Maria Dei Fiori in Florence, no easy accomplishment in that day.

Few people are aware that Filippo was also a clockmaker. According to Vasari, his biographer he made several of them. Unfortunately, Vasari did not describe any of them.



### 17th CENTURY HOROLOGICAL TRIVIA

Charles II of England (1630-1685) was known for being a ladies man. He was also a staunch patron of science, horology in particular.

It was in honor of his patronage that the seconds pendulum was known as the Royal Pendulum. Hooke's balance spring experiment was first demonstrated for him (the 14 foot pendulum kept oscilating by a watch balance).


Charles was a true clock nut for he had seven in his bedroom which didn't bother him but the lack of striking syncronization drove his servants crazy.

On his deathbed, with family gathered, he told his brother, who succeeded him, to "be kind to Portsmouth" (a mistress) and "let not poor Nelly starve" (another mistress, Nell Gwyn).

He then asked that the curtains be drawn as he wanted to see the dawn for the last time.

Next he asked that the new 8 day clock be wound for it was the day. He died at noon.

TICK FEVER ...

Famous Marriages.

Anthony and Cleopatra, Romeo and Juliet... Well, you can see I'm not talking about real marriages, just love affairs. And don't let your love affair with a clock or watch trick you into buying a "marriage" unknowingly.

"Marriage" is the word collectors use to describe a clock or watch where the movement is not original to the case. Of course that reduces the value of the piece significantly. You may want to buy the piece even knowing it is a marriage, but you should pay accordingly.

An honest dealer or fellow collector will tell you he is selling a marriage, if he knows. Sometimes its hard to tell, but usually it isn't.

A few tips I've found useful to detect marriages are:

- 1. The price. If its too low to be true, watch out.
- 2. Extra holes in the case where a different movement was mounted. In a watch, open the back and look for screw head marks on the case where a different movement's case screws originally were.
- 3. Patches on the dial where the winding holes have been moved, or a completely replaced dial. Sometimes the dial comes with the wrong movement and you will find wrong screw holes in the case under the dial, where the old original dial pan was screwed on.

- 4. Disagreement between maker's name on movement and on case, even if screw holes match.
- 5. Cut off seat boards or trimmed side pieces which support seat board on a tall clock.
- 6. Poor fit of the case around the dial of a tall clock.
- 7. And of course, wrong period or nationality such as an English movement in a German case.


Just keep your eyes open, above all, ask the seller if the clock is all original or what parts are not, and don't be in too much of a hurry to buy. In passion, we all lose our critical facilities, they say.
