

WITCHES BREW

Many wood case clocks we have collected have been covered with old wax, grease, dust, oil, spider webs, and 'what nots'. We have found that WITCHES BREW will clean the dirt from the case and will not affect the case or the original finish-including varnishes, paint, shellacs, adamantine, lacquer, et al. Do not use Brew on dials or faces as these are special problems.

If the case needs minor repairs, make them before you clean the clock case. The wash solution from the Witches Brew will help blend repair areas. Excess dust may be wiped off first with a soft cloth, but it is not

necessary.

Witches Brew should be applied liberally to the selected work area with a soft cloth. use a tooth brush or other soft brush for corners and hard to get at areas. Wash gently with the Brew-let the soap do the work. You can use 0000 (4 Ott) steel wool and gently wash the area. (Do not vigorously scrub using the steel wool). Clean off the excess Brew often with soft kitchen paper towels or cloth to remove the dirt. Let the Brew stand on the work area for several minutes and gently wash before removing. When you are satisfied the case is clean, let the case dry for about 24 hours. Then use "Scotts Liquid Gold"-wood cleaner and preservative available at the grocery store. (There may be equal cleaners). Apply the Liquid Gold following their directions, Use a soft cloth and go over the cleaned case. (Be sure you clean the back and insides)

What a surprise on how sharp and clean the case looks. We have had excellent success.

WITCHES BREW FORMULA (For one quart of Brew)

1. 4 Table spoons (2 cup) of Boiled linseed oil. (Boiled linseed as bought in the store)

2. 4 Table spoons (2 cup) of Turpentine
3. About 1/3 cup of Ivory Snow pure soap

4. Add warm water to make one quart. Mix the soap in the water before adding other mix.

5. Shake Well.

WITCHES BREW* Continued:

After shaking well the mixture will separate after standing a short time. -no problem.

Put the left over Witches Brew in a closed container (we use a quart glass jar) It can be set aside for several weeks/months and used again. To use again bring the BREW to room temperature, shake well and it is ready to use.

USE THIS WITCHES BREW AT YOUR OWN RISK (This keeps us from being sued if you or

your finish goes haywire)

We have never had any problems. Good luck and let us know how you make out.


The book covers dates and serial numbers for easy period identification. It also has many catalog page excerpts which are both entertaining and informative.


The best part is that you can usually find Karl at one of the meetings to sign the book and you'll have a personnally autographed book by the author. (I have one).
