

HOROLOGICAL TRIVIA

- * French Ivory is merely celluoid. Also there is <u>no</u> silver in German Silver.
- * James M. Breckenridge of Meriden, Mass. was the inventor of the wire bell around the 1830's. The first bell was made using a steel bar which was coiled after considerable labor, bending, hardening, tempering, etc., but it was successful and lead to the common wire bell.
- * The composition of clock feet, side decorations, and column tops and other finials was 87% lead and 13% antimony.
- * William L. Gilbert, clockmaker, one of the richest citizens in Winsted, Conn., died on July 3, 1890.
- * B.B. Lewis, born 1819, is credited with inventing the calendar for clocks in 1845 whilw working as a jeweler in Huron, Ohio. F.W. Carter, clock mfr., was forst to use it, followed by the E.N. Welch & Co. and E. Ingraham Co.. Lewis got 50¢ to \$1 royalty per clock for the use of his calendar.
- * In October, 1931, Waterbury Clock Co. was still making the Black Mantel Clock.
- * Use of gilt in the 1700's and early 1800's was not done because of expense and the lack of buyer demand for it.
- * Women, Take A Bow! They did much of the assembly work on 8 day clock movements and watches. Clock makers recognized the women had greater dexterity and performed the operation better and quicker.

Unusual Wear in Some German New Clock Movements

A problem has developed in the manufacture of some newer German clock movements. Some German manufacturers decided to reduce machining labor costs and making parts faster by using a new softer metal for clock pivots and arbors. The softer metal is a time bomb causing the deteriation of the pivots in 2 to 3 years. (of course, after the warranty has expired).

The pivots disintegrate leaving cracks & Ridges which will not polish out. The only repair solution is to replace the pivot (this is very costly) and of course repair the damages in the bushing area.

Some clock repair people will not even attempt to make repairs for their customers. (Fix on pivot and another will fail some place else).

There is a solution! The Germans can return to the time tested oil tempered steel. There is no short-cut to quality.
