

Modern Cleck Case Design

I have been looking at new (?) clocks in various retail stores to see what case style changes have occurred since 1910. Clock cases reflects current fashions and financial means of buyers. The elimination of the pendulum, and with the new electric quartz, digitals, clock radios, microwave clocks, et al, have had a dramatic affect on the need for shelf and wall clock cases. Most nice cases are now bought as conversation pieces rather than the need for a timepiece.

All in all the new clock cases are mostly flat squares, round, copies of antique cases, and of course a myriad of interesting bouncing wire pseudo pendulums, and pictures.

There is a very minor resurrection of Westminister windup clecks and in eld style cases-mestly camelback and bracket cases.

The new weed cleck cases are predeminate—
ly cepies of the schoolhouse, camelback, brack—
et, ectegen, gallery, and cuckoes. Even the
Grandfathers are reproductions. This may be
indictive of our society—easier to copy than
to be ingenious.

I saw redweed burl case clecks (net bad), also electric works mounted in pictures, on fabric, whatever, you name it. But there has been no unique case style, so stylish as to be copied by other makers as done in the good old days.

Perhaps, there are no dominant clock case design shapes left-but I doubt it. Eli Terry, Jerome, Ingraham, et al. where are you?

What cleck case would you buy today made after 1950 that you would save as a collector cleck for the year 2000? Tough choice, Huh?
