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

#### U.S. Patent Information

Have you ever wondered about the inventor's data represented by the Patent number found on your watch or clock? Don't wonder any longer. Here is how to get copies of U.S. patents & Trademarks.

- 1. Write to: Commissioner of Patents
  & Trademarks
  Washington, DC 20231
- Include the Patent number and if possible, the name of the patentee, the invention & the date.
- 3. Enclose \$1.50 for each copy of the Patent. (Postage is free)

If you wish, you can request a free booklet "General Information Concerning Patents" which gives details on applying for a Patent or Trademark, and also how to obtain Copies of existing Patents & Trademarks. At Sunnyvale, 68 miles from Pleasant Hill at 1500 Partridge Avenue, Bldg. 7; Phone number (408) 738-5580, there is the largest Patent center other than Washington, DC. It is called the Patent Information Clearinghouse (PIC). The PIC has copies of 'The Report of the Commissioner of Patents from 1790 (When Patent #1 was issued) to 1835. The PIC has copies of the Official Gazette from 1836 to the present. The Gazette contains a brief writeup of the Patent with some diagrams (Some interesting reading). You may make copies of the Gazette pages on PIC Xerox for 15¢.

You cannot see the original patents but you can get a copy for \$3 if you pick up or \$4 by mail. If you go to Sunnyvale, get all the information you can on the Patent (ie. dates, Patentee, assignors, etc.). For example, I had the patent number on Seth Thomas Adamanting-found it was invented

the Celluloid Manufacturing Co. Seth apparently got it from the Celluloid Co.. However the Patent number remained the same.

## No More Wholesale Priced Antique Clocks & Watches

If you are planning a Clock and Watch hunting trip to England & other foreign countries, don't be surprised to find the wholesale markets and other sources for wholesale clocks and watches have essentially dried up. Many Many American wholesellers have or are in the process of 'going out of business' because of no replacement available for their stock. Even though there were millions and millions of clocks & watches made, the supply is limited, even in Japan. Many of the timepieces were destroyed by fires, wars, & other disasters, & many were thrown out when they would no longer run, or they were replaced with newer models.

Prices of clocks & watches in Europe and on the East Coast of the U.S. are now about the same as here It is estimated that 20% of the timepieces found in Europe were made in America. Most of this 20% have been returned back to the U.S. by American dealers & collectors. There may be a few sleepers out there, but it won't be easy to find them.

Old clocks & watches prices rose sharply when numerous books were published showing the price range for various models. The fun of clock & watch collecting will decrease with the scarcity of clocks & the high prices.
BUT...continue looking and having fun finding those sleepers just waiting to be found.

### Horology Stamp Not Approved For 1987

We have learned through Comgressman's George Miller office that the proposed NAWCC Horology commemorative stamp honoring Watches Clocks was not approved for the calendar year, 1987. However, the Postmaster General's Citizen's Advisory Group considers the Horological stamp as a viable subject for a future commemorative issue.

We feel that the National NAWCC and the efforts of our Chapter was just excellent. As you might guess, there is keen, keen competition on subjects for commemorative stamps issues, especially by emotional & pressure groups. We were told that our efforts were a major step for the issuance of a Horology stamp in 2 or 3 years.
