

WINDING YOUR POCKETWATCH:

If you have a good quality or high-grade pocket watch that you expect to keep accurate time, you should keep in mind three precepts, as regards winding:

- 1. Wind regularly
- 2. Wind in the morning and
- 3. do not wind it too tightly.

The reason for winding regularly is in order to use the same amount of uncoiling of the mainspring each day. Wind in the morning because usually a person's habits are more regular then, the spring will be taut and pulling with its greatest force while the watch is worn (and subjected to the motions and jolts and uses of the day) and because there is less danger of breaking the mainspring (mainsprings sometimes break at night just after taken from a warm pocket, wound up tightly, and then put in a cooler place — due to temperature contraction of the already tightly coiled spring).

There are three reasons why a watch should not be wound too tightly: The oil is squeezed out, too much tension is put on the escapement, and there is a danger of breaking the mainspring, particularly if wound at night.
