
I'm asking the Committee Chairpersons from 1986 to serve again in 1987. They may not be able to which means I'll need help from you, our members.

New Paragraph B:

Visitors are members of the NAWCC, but not of the Chapter, who have registered with the membership committee. Visitors may participate in the Mart.

Add new Paragraph C: FEES

Guests and Visitors must be registered with the membership committee and have paid the Chapters fee to attend the meeting or Mart.


