'The Tip Off' from the work Bench By Phil Russell

I am pleased that Bob Ziriax of Classic Clocks in Turlock is continuing articles on his methods of refinishing. If you have questions about Clocks and watches let me know-I'll get your answer from the 'Experts'.

The Use of Fasteners in Case Restoration By Bob Ziriak

There is nothing that draws the eye as quickly as a mix in the metal of the hinges and the screws that holds them in place. I do not try and reuse screws in old cases as they are probably rusted or if brass, have a chewed up slot. Also todays brass screws are foreign made and very soft and are not reusable. I make a practice of never reusing a screw and replacing brass on brass and steel on steel.

I buy the screws by the box, since many are defective, you will not be tempted to use poor ones. I buy by the box of 100. They are cheaper this way.

Screw size selection: In selecting the size of the screw, look at the size of the hole in the hinge. The screw head should be countersunk in the hole just enough to be slightly larger than the hinge hole when fully inserted.

screw Holes: Before replacing the screws, look carefully at the screw holes. Look for cracks in the wood due to the use of oversize screws. Also look for rust encrusted holes, enlarged by the use of rusted steel screws.

rillers: Be cautioks when using a wood filler to fill screw holes. Many of these harden to the point of splitting the wood when a screw is inserted. Better to use a wood putty which hardens more slowly, and gives more when the screw is inserted.

Closing wood cracks: If the clock case is made of thick wood, and a large crack exists, you

might consider pulling the crack together with a screw. The screw is countersunk so that the head is not visible. The hole is filled with wood putty-or better-a dowel. First predrill hole and insert screw and attempt to pull the crack closed. If successful, withdraw the screw and place glue in the crack and on the screw and replace screw. When the screw is tightened, some glue will be squeezed out and this glue should be promptly removed.

If using a dowel to fill hole over the screw head, insert dowel and marked so that it is slightly longer than the hole is deep. Gut off so that a very slight amount protrudes out of the hole. This should be sanded to surrounding level and stained and refinished with the rest of the case.



Why Veneers?

veneers produces fine quality clock cases and other furniture at a far less cost than using solid quality wood. One piece of quality wood can be cut into 14-20 pieces of veneer.

Veneers have been used for over 3500 years. Veneers are thin strips of wood cut from a fine quality wood such as mahogany, ebony, oak and

many other woods.

Before 1820 weneers were cut by hand saws (Chauncey Jerome talked about using a hand saw to cut weneers from magohany planks he obtained in New York). Hand sawed veneers were often more than 1/16" thick. Thus for every 1" of wood almost 16 veneer strips could be cut. Then in about 1820 the circular water driven power saws were used to cut veneers. The power saw reduced labor costs and prices were reduced considerably. Quality, quantity, and uniform thickness were sharply improved. Some veneers today are paper thin.

Sometime the selected veneer wood is not adequately seasoned or dried. This will cause shrinking and rsult in ragged cracks and also veneer separation. This is often seen in the

crossbattens on wall clocks.

In England before 1700 a veneering process called Marquetry was used. Various colored veneers were stacked and cut into patterns by a saw called a Markatrie cutter -like a jig saw puzzle. The pieces were very effectively fit together in flower patters and other artistic designs. We see this Marquetry in many English clocks and other quality cases.

Veneers are here to stay. The latest is the veneering of oak, mahogany, etal on cheap paricle board for TV cases and other furniture.
