

## "Do it While You Can .....!" a story from life ... (Roy Holman's)

Several years ago my wife and I took a trip South and East and visited some of the early dirt pyramids and mounds built by the very early American Indians. One site for extensive mounds is Chillicothe, Ohio. While in Chillicothe I decided to visit a small museum as we had some time to spare.

The museum tended to feature European and "white-mans" objects through 1910 or so. Part of this exhibit were a number of clocks. One of these was a kitchen clock on which the door was slightly ajar. Naturally I decided to peek inside. Much to my surprise the paper was in excellent condition and proclaimed that this clock was "special" as it came with ivory bushings. I noted that with only passing interest and we went on our way.

As I drove back to California the ivory bushings became more and more interesting.

I wrote to the NAWCC library and was informed that they had no information on such bushings except for a paragraph in an article that such (ivory) bushings had been used. Later on I wrote to the NAWCC Chapter in Ohio and suggested that some member look at the clock and report back on it - unfortunately I received no response.

My wife and I again went East and I drove several hundred miles out of our way to see the clock again. Alas and alack, they had "rearranged" the exhibit and the "my" clock was no longer on display. By chance a man who was there had the keys to their storage and he agreed to let me look around. There were a number of clocks stored but not the one that I was interested in. Also they had no record of what might have happened to it.

I had a chance to develop some special data on a special and unusual clock and blew it. If anyone of you ever come across a clock with ivory bushings please make good notes and forward to the National. You may only have one chance so do it while you can!

The so called Presentation Banjo started at about \$80 circa 1810.
