

A special 11:30AM visit to Fred and Penny Bausch's clock shop "Clocksmith"


(806 El Camino Real, San Carlos 650-592-1762)

Directions to Clocksmith:

Take Highway 880 to the San Mateo Bridge Turnoff.
Go over the San Mateo Bridge and take the 101 turnoff to San Jose.
Continue South (approx. 3 1/2 miles) and take the Holly Street exit.
At the stoplight turn right and continue to El Camino Real.
Turn left on El Camino Real and continue to 806 El Camino Real.

Park in the back of the shop and come in the rear entrance. See you at 11:30AM.

KNOW YOUR FELLOW MEMBERS

—WALT HUBRIG—

Walt became interested in clocks in 1975 when his mother-in-law passed away and his wife (Dottie) inherited an Ansonia 30-hour O.G. that did not work. Dottie noticed an adult education class for clock repair so he signed up. He liked it so well, he repeated it, then took Royal English's advanced course. After retirement in 1991 he worked in Royal's shop as a volunteer one day a week for a year.

Walt has been a Chapter member since 1987. He keeps our Chapter tool library for member use. He has also been Chapter Treasurer since 1994.

Since 1993 he has been donating time and parts to repair clocks for Hospice of Walnut Creek. People donate clocks that do not work and are unsaleable. He tries to give them new life plus income for Hospice. The best Hospice clock so far has been a Seth Thomas 4 bell Sonora chime.

ADDING GOLD

I really like new and innovative methods of repairing clocks(or old ones rediscovered). It shows ingenuity is not dead. This how-to-tip came in from Steve Fabes' brother-in-law in England. Using gold leaf for small jobs may be difficult and using an airbrush may be difficult if you don't have a compressor already. Here is Herb's way: Take a leaf or two of gold leaf (it isn't expensive) and grind it up (in an egg-cup if you like) with a teaspoonful of honey. When you have reduced this to a paste, fill the egg-cup with very hot water. Stir, wait a few seconds, and pour the water off, leaving the gold at the bottom of the container. Repeat this process with two or three lots of hot water, then leave it for a day for the rest of the water to evaporate. Now add a drop of lacquer or varnish to it, and you have a little drop of gold paint which will last for years. Steve has not tried this yet but he thought he might try to substitute clearer KARO for honey. An American improvement.

CHAPTER #107 BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

There were two Directors Meetings in February. One was held at the home of Dale Garner on Feb 2nd and one following our Membership Meeting Feb 8th.

The budget for 1998 was discussed and approved.

The Golden Gate Regional is coming up in October. The three Bay Area Chapters, #5 Dr. Stephens, #94 De Anza, and #107 Diablo Valley will rotate the hosting of the Regionals. Chapter #94 will host this year we will host in 1999 and Chapter #5 has the year 2000. The Chapter will be in charge and the co-hosts will assist. The convention center in Oakland remains the location.

A "Suitcase Program" is being developed by the National. These are technical courses that are similar to the ones conducted at National Headquarters, except they are held throughout the country. Our chapter has been asked to submit names of prospective instructors in our area.

San Francisco State had a horological repair course at one time but it has been discontinued. Price Russ feels there may be some horological equipment and supplies available to groups such as ours, and he is looking into the matter.

We are sending \$100 to the American Clock and Watch Museum in Bristol, Connecticut, to support their continuing operation.

Jay Taylor is looking into assisting the City of Alameda with the planned restoration of their City Hall clock tower.

At 680/24 take Highway 24 to Oakland/Lafayette
Take first exit - Pleasant Hill Road South
Go under freeway onto Pleasant Hill Rd
At end, turn left on Olympic
At light, turn right onto Tice Valley
Go up until first light
Go another 150 yards and just before Pedestrian X-ing - turn right into
Acalanes Adult Center, Del Valle Theater - room D-1
(address 1963 Tice Valley Boulevard)
