

Bailey who spoke on the The Life and Times of Lewis Eberhardt, Robert C. Cheney spoke on The Importance of Commerce and Trade in Southern Clockmaking, 1760-1825, and Snowden Taylor on exportation of Connecticut Clocks to the South. In all, there were some 12 speakers over the two days.

The highlight was the tour of the Colonial Williamsburg Dewitt Wallace Decorative Arts Gallery where no holds were barred. We were directed to an area where bracket clocks and watches were out on tables for us to examine. There were white gloves and flashlights on the tables for viewers to use for closer examination. The people were really excited about this. I was able to inspect a bracket clock by Joseph Ellicott. Where else without special arrangements, would you be able to do that. Bonnets on important tall case clocks were also removed. If you ever get a chance to attend one of these seminars, you will not be disappointed.

Last, but not least I would like to thank all of my Officers, Directors, and Committee Chairs for their help this year and especially John Stohr for helping me keep all things in proper perspective. Also I would like to thank one and all for allowing me the opportunity to serve as your president for 1998.

I was born in San Francisco, grew up in Berkeley, and graduated from the University of California in 1947. I was an electrical engineer with PG&E for 37 years and have been retired for 14

years.

I became interested in clocks when my wife showed me a listing for a clock repair class given at Acalanes Adult Education Center. I enrolled in the second class given by Dave Morgan, the originator of this very successful course and now the NAWCC President. Sarah and Phil Russell were members of the first class and very helpful to this novice. I stayed in the class a couple of years (Earl Glenk, Dorothy's husband took over the class when Dave was transferred to N.J.).

Sometime in that first semester I answered an ad for a clock. I didn't buy the clock but before I left his house, John Sanderson convinced me to join the NAWCC. I joined in 1976 and shortly afterward became a member of Chapter 5. When Chapter 107 was formed I became one of the original members. I have served several terms as an officer or director and have been Raffle chairman probably too long.

My interest in clocks is primarily in repairing rather than in collecting and almost not-at-all in selling/trading. There is always a new (to me) movement detail, new problems or different solutions.
