

### Tresident's Message

The last two months have been a sort of horological quiet time for me in the sense that I have not been working on anything in particular. Actually I got really frustrated with a pocket watch and decided to let repairs rest for a bit. I don't know about others, but I find one of the best ways to really "fix" things is to work on them when I'm not in the right frame of mind. Although I have not been "doing" much, I have taken advantage of several trips to visit clock shops and collectors. Before trips I try to look through The Mart for dealers and collectors where I'm going and then try to visit a few. I've met some really nice people as well as seen some amazing pieces. A real highlight for me was holding both an Arnold and a Breguet chronometer on the same day. Unfortunately these opportunities can be very transient. This was brought home to me recently when I returned to two shops that had impressed me on visits just a few years ago and found both had closed. This presented me with what might be called "dawdler's remorse". It is very similar to "buyer's remorse" except you still have your money. Anyway it reminded me that opportunities have to be taken when they present themselves. While I'm on the subject of travel, I might mention that the Seattle area has some really nice street clocks. There is a nice 4-face one in downtown Seattle and there is a 2-faced beauty in Tacoma. The Tacoma one has glass sides on the base and the movement is lit so it really stands out.

Those who attended the last Friday meeting saw the second half of the Smith video on turning. It is now available in our chapter library. As I discussed previously, I am working with headquarters to acquire a group of their tapes. This will be a joint resource with Chapter 5. The tapes will remain the property of the national organization, but we will maintain possession of them so they will be readily available. Because these are not part of the chapter library, I will serve as their custodian/librarian. I hope to have the first ones shortly. If there are tapes you would like to see in either the chapter library or this special collection, please, let me know.

The June meeting will feature the ugly clock contest, cookie competition, and the annual auction of "treasures". Bring those ugly timepieces and all those miscellaneous items that someone else needs more than you do. Notice I said ugly timepieces. I think we should allow ugly watches to compete as well as clocks.

### Resource Highlights:

Tool collection – Many of us don't claim to work on battery-operated timepieces, but most of us do to some extent. Our tool library includes several testers designed for watches and clocks. One is a "Citizen Multi-Tester". While it was marketed for use on Citizen timepieces, it is a pretty general tester. Another is the "Renotest Quick Checker". Its claim to fame is giving simple "good/bad" indication for various functions of analog quartz and tuning fork watches. Finally we have an Accutron meter.

Library – The book I was going to recommend turns out not to be in our library. This surprised me because it is one Loren used to donate for the drawing. I will recommend it anyway because it is inexpensive and not too hard to find. It is "History of the American Clock Business" by Chauncey Jerome. I found it a delightful mix of early-American horological history, home-spun philosophy, and his view of his life.



I was born in Alameda but have lived in Oakland full time ever since. I attended public schools in East Oakland and have a degree in Decorative Art from Cal. I worked in my dad's butcher shop off and on from Jr. High days. My adult life's work consisted of interior decorating, the retail meat business, and later,



teaching school in Berkeley, first as an environmental yard teacher and then as a 1st grade primary teacher, retiring in 1983.

### **BY-LAWS CHANGES**

I have seen several comments about the proposed by-laws changes. All have been pretty negative. Below are a couple of examples of those comments. I think anything that draws this much attention in an organization which is very low key deserves a long look. Perhaps we should take a few minutes of our next meeting to discuss the issues. — Editor.

NAWCC proposed by-laws vote scheduled for June/July 1999. The Internet NAWCC member's forum has been in heavy discussion over the past few weeks with regards to the new proposed by-laws revisions. After reading the current by-laws and the revisions being proposed, I see no benefit to the NAWCC or the membership with passing any of the proposed revisions. To further complicate the issue, the by-laws that are being submitted for voting are not in the same language or format as proposed by the Ways and Means committee who had worked on the proposals for over a year before presenting them to the NAWCC Council and that's been over a year as well. I strongly suggest all members carefully read the proposed changes and consider what the implications are for the Association. On a side note I have decided that a VOTE of NO across the board is in order and have submitted my name for a letter that will be sent to all Chapters from NAWCC forum members that are strongly opposed to this by-laws change. — Jay Taylor of our chapter.

The TIC-TOC GAZETTE (Santa Anita Chapter 116's bulletin) in its May 1999 issue stated 'several of the changes definitely get a "thumbs down".

Chapter 71, Sacramento Valley, sent out a note to their members suggesting they look at all the issues and to definitely vote no on question 16.

The Friday program was "Keith Davis U.K. Clock Maker". He also restores old (1600 - 1700) clocks, removing additions added through the years and figuring out what goes into original holes in the plates.

Saturday Capt. Paul Middento, Navy retired, spoke on 'Chronometers and Navigation' giving a history others in the quest of Time Keepers. He also said wristwatches are now better timepieces than any mechanical clocks.

There were 1255 attendees. It was sold out with 172 full tables and 44 half tables.

2. An incabloc is a device which lets the endstone of a balance to give thus absorbing a shock.

1. Wooden Clock movements were used because brass was expensive. They were generally made between 1800 and 1840.
