


Library – Ever need to repair metal case parts? The library has several books and collections of reprints on jewelry repair that can provide guidance.

Ingredients

KNOW YOUR FELLOW MEMBERS

I married my beautiful wife in August 1977 and started my employment with VISA in 1978. We have been more than blessed with our four wonderful children, Chelsea 11, Alexander 9, Caroline 6 and Max 4, who all by the first grade keep getting the same homework assignment of counting all clocks with faces and all digital clocks in the house. When Caro-



line completed this assignment last month I believe the count was a little over 200 clocks and 7 digital. (I just can't find a VCR or OVEN with a pendulum.)

My parents always had a few clocks in the house, but when I met Kathy and her family it was a different story. As some of you already know my father-in-law is Bert Hayenga, the infamous inventor of the Torsion Beat Calibrator. I believe it was my third date with Kathy when Bert said, "you look like a strong boy" and took me over to a clock dealer to help him pick up an antique 9 foot German grandfather clock. Bert had been into collecting numerous antiques for many years and one thing he liked collecting was clocks, any clock he could find he was buying and they weren't anniversary clocks back then. I actually did not start collecting until about 1986/7 after lucking into to some great buys at estate sales and auctions. So after finding several real bargains the bug had bitten me.

I joined the NAWCC in 1991 after finding out about the organization from Fred and Penny Bausch of the Clocksmith in San Carlos. I had by that time probably close to 75 clocks and had decided before we kept buying that we should do more research rather then keep spending without understanding the clocks more. Shortly after joining the NAWCC (I made Bert join also as a family member) we started attending Chapter 5 and shortly after that

started attending Chapter 107 meeting. It was at a Chapter 5 meeting that I finally met and started talking with Bob MacIver. This was to be a wonderful friendship that I will cherish the rest of my life. For it was Bob that started me thinking about repair and restoration work. Then in 1993 and 1994 I along with Bert attended the first NAWCC Suitcase Clock Repair classes in Sacramento. The basic knowledge from that along with lots of practice and help from Bob helped me learn my basic clock repair techniques.

At the same time I started working at the Chapter level first at Chapter 107 as a director then as President for 2 years. While working at the Chapter level for 107 the local bay area chapters started the Regionals up again and I participated as Security and Red Cap Chair in 1996, followed by Exhibit Chair in 1997 and Seminar Chair in 1998. Now comes the big challenge as I have been selected to Chair the 1999 Golden Gate Regional. While active in Chapter 107 I remain active as well in Chapter 5. I started serving on the Chapter 5 board in 1998 as Vice President and this year 1999 was elected President of Chapter 5. As part of many other activities I am chairing an effort with other bay area members of the NAWCC working with the City and Alameda and a committee formed by the city "Alamedan's Restoring The Tower" (ARTT). Since Alameda was the home of Dr. Barclay Stephens (and is where we have decided to reside and raise our children) it was a natural fit to bring the City project restoring the original clock together with Chapter 5, The Dr. Barclay Stephens Memorial Chapter, to work a period correct tower clock. I still enjoy clocks of all types and enjoy repairing and restoration work. FILOLI PROJECT

At our technical meeting last Friday night, members approved of taking on the task of restoring the movements of the four clocks to running condition. We have more than enough volunteers to carry out the task. It was brought up that these four tall case clocks should be set up, leveled and secured to the wall when the movements are reinstalled by our chapter. The clocks should not be moved each year at the Holiday Season as they will be moved this November. This could only do harm to the movements and undo the work that had been done.

What is FILOLI? Well I copied this information from their web site at http://www.filoli.org/history.htm. The pictures and information on the site make Filoli a place I want to visit.

Filoli was the vision of Mr. & Mrs. William Bowers Bourn II, owners of the Empire Gold Mine in Grass Valley. Bourn chose the name, Filoli, from the first two letters of the words: Fight-Love-Live, to fight for a just cause; to love your fellow man; to live a good life; was a credo Bourn believed in. Mr. & Mrs. Bourn chose to work with Willis Polk, prominent California architect, who had already designed homes for them in San Francisco and Grass Valley. While Polk borrowed from the English Country House tradition, he designed a uniquely California estate.

The Georgian Revival house, built between 1915 and 1917, with its Flemish bond brick exterior, French windows, arched double chimneys and the Spanish tile roof could be nowhere but in California. It is an outstanding example of country house architecture in the United States, and is one of the few in California that remains intact in its original setting. It is noteworthy for elegantly carved interior mouldings and marble fireplace facades, inlaid parquet floors, magnificent doorways, and a superb sense of space and proportion in the 17-foot high major rooms.

The garden at Filoli is a succession of separate areas or garden rooms each with a distinct character. The Filoli garden is considered one of the finest examples of a private estates garden representing the "Golden Age of American Gardens". the house and gardens were designed as complimentary units with the north-south axis of the garden echoing the line of the house's transverse hall and the line of the existing valley.

Filoli is located off 280 in Woodside (Southwest of San Mateo). The number to call for visitor information is (650) 364-8300. It has very specific dates and times it is open so I suggest you do check the web or call.

Lacquering.....

If brass weights and dials tarnish quickly, lacquer with 30% lacquer and 70% lacquer thinner. This mixture is so thin, it can be brushed on without showing brush marks. It is preferable, however, to spray or dip the article to be lacquered. WARNING....... BE SURE YOU USE THE SAME BRAND LACQUER AS THINNER, TO ELIMINATE CRYSTALIZATION.

BRITISH RECOMMENDATONS

A must see in England is the fantastic British watch and clock collection in central London at the Guildhall Library on Gresham Street (nearest subway "tube" station is BANK). It is open Mon. to Sat. 9:30 - 17:00. Also a must to see is the Old Royal Observatory at Greenwich. It is a nice boat ride away on the Thames River or one can take city bus transportation there.

THE OLD ROYAL OBSERVATORY

Information from a pamphlet provided by Bert Bradley

The Old Royal Observatory at Greenwich was founded in 1675 by Charles II to find out the "so much desired longitude of places for perfecting the art of navigation." The architect was Sir Christopher Wren, who designed St Paul's Cathedral and was himself an astronomer. The Observatory was built on the foundations of Duke Humphrey's Tower, which had stood on the site since 1438. John Flamsteed, the first Astronomer Royal, moved into the new building, now named Flamsteed House, in July 1676.

By the 1930's the smoke and streetlights of London made observing in Greenwich Park impossible, so after 1945, the Royal Observatory moved to Herstmonceux Castle in Sussex. The Royal Greenwich observatory is now based at Cambridge and La Palms in the Canary Islands. In 1956 the Old Royal Observatory became part of the National Maritime Museum.

Besides walking through the buildings and reading about the enormous prize offered for the first practical solution for finding longitude at sea, you can stand astride the Meridian line, having one foot in the eastern hemisphere and one in the western. You can also read about the "time-lady" who would travel daily to London with a clock showing Greenwich time.



DIRECTIONS TO THE PICNIC AT LOIS' HOUSE

You need to get to South Main near the Kaiser Hospital in Walnut Creek. If you are using the freeways take one of 680's Walnut Creek/South Main exits. When using the south 680 off ramp turn left onto South Main at the stoplight (for the north off ramp continue straight ahead). Then turn left onto Lilac at the second stoplight (Hickory Pit Restaurant). If you are coming south on So. Main turn right at the Lilac Drive stoplight (Hickory Pit Restaurant). It is one block past the So. Main/Newell intersection (landmark Kaiser Hospital south of the Broadway shopping center). Continue on Lilac going under the 680 freeway. Turn left at the second Arlene Drive (Arlene Drive is a loop). Turn right on Arlene Lane. Lois' is the third house on the right- 20 Arlene Lane.
