


# A NOTE FROM THE REGIONAL CHAIRMAN Jay Taylor







#### LAST MONTH'S QUESTION

John Stohr sent me an answer regarding last month's question about fixing metal pieces that have lost their brass color. It seems that J. M. Huckabee answered that question in the September edition of the AWI's Horological Times. He suggested using Krylon's brass paint. For you that don't get the Horological Times it is an excellent magazine full of all kinds of technical articles.

In the June 1979 Bulletin under TIPS I found the following TIP:

Brass Coating — to coat iron or steel articles with brass, immerse them in a solution of: -1/2 oz. sulphate of copper; 1/2 oz. stannbus chloride; 2 pints water. Stir the articles in the solution until the required color is obtained.



#### **MUSEUMS**

The National clock Museum in Columbia, Pennsylvania opened its new doors on October 23rd. However, the Time Museum in Rockford, Illinois owned by Seth Atwood closed its doors earlier this year. Chicago mayor Daley who likes clocks is raising \$20,000,000 to place the collection on display in the Museum of Science and Industry. Sotheby's auction house will dispose of 81 of the exotic items. THIS NEW FASHION CALLED FOR AN UPSURGE IN THE USE OF PRECIOUS AND SEMI-PRECIOUS STONES IN THE MANUFACTURE OF JEW-ELRY. OFTEN IT CALLED FOR SOME TRICK TO SET ONE APART FROM ANOTHER IN THE COMPETITION FOR THE MARKET, THUS APPEARED MOVEMENT IN JEW-ELRY....FLOWERS OR FERNS THAT MOVED, BUTTER-FLIES OR HUMMINGBIRDS THAT MOVED THROUGH THE USE OF A CONCEALED BATTERY, ONE PARISJEWELER OUTDID THEM ALL BY THE USE OF A REAL LIVE TOR-TOISE COMPLETE WITH GLUED ON JEWELS. (ONE HUN-DRED YEARS LATER, IT'S BRINE SHRIMP!)

THE MOST DISTRESSING FAD OF THIS ERA, AT LEAST TO THE COLLECTOR, WAS THE USE OF OLD WATCH PARTS IN JEWELRY MAKING. WATCHES WERE DISMANTLED, AND THEN HEAVILY PLATED. THE PLATED PARTS WERE THEM MADE INTO NECKLACES, EARRINGS, BROOCHES, AND SCARF PINS. THE BEAUTIFULLY PIERCED COCKS WERE USED FOR THE HEADS OF HAIRPINS AND FOR EARRINGS. THEY MUST HAVE MADE LOVELY ORNAMENTS, BUT OHI SUCH A DESECRATION OF FINE OLD WATCHES!
