

ABOUT MERCURY PENDULUMS AND INVAR PENDULUM RODS

From time to time I've heard or read about mercury pendulums with Invar rods. This brings up two questions:

. Why a mercury pendulum?

. Why an Invar rod?

The answer to both is about the same. To correct or eliminate the temperature error of pendulum clocks. However, it the two are used together it results in defeat of the attempt.

George Graham invented the mercury pendulum in 1721 to correct for the expansion or contraction of the then used brass or iron pendulum rod when the temperature rose or fell, which made the clock run slow or fast. The much greater coefficient of expansion of mercury compared to brass or iron made possible the expansion of mercury upward from the bottom of the vial to overcome the expansion of the longer length of metal rod in downward direction, keeping the effective length of the pendulum the same.

Lets look at question No. 2. Invar alloy invented 1898 has a coefficient of expansion of almost 0. Thus there is no temperature error to correct. So, if one were to use the two together (mercury and Invar) the mercury would re-introduce the error which the Invar had eliminated.

Over the years there have been many attempts to correct temperature errors, some practical, some not, such as Ellicott's Pendulum, Harrison's Gridiron Pendulum, also a large zinc bob on an iron rod, etc.

Household clocks in thermostat controlled homes are not usually accurate enough to need a temperature corrected pendulum due to other errors of a larger size than caused by a rather small temperature change.

OLD WOODSCREWS AND THE CLOCKS

The first very crude wood screws were used in about 1720 in the furniture industry, primarily to replace nails for attaching hinges. Making these metal screws by hand was a slow and difficult job. The doors of old Grandfather clocks were attached by these old screws. These hand made screws were very crude, the threads were hard to construct evenly and ended up very irregular and rough. The shank of the screw was rough, not well rounded. Marks of the hammer may be seen on the shank. The old screws did not have a point; they were cut off.

The screw heads were made by pounding the ends, and were roughly rounded. The screw head slot was made last and was very, very narrow and usually off center. It took a sharp screwdriver to get into the slot. The length of the screw was rarely longer than half an inch. As expected from the labor to make them, the screws were very expensive.

Before the screw, hinges were applied by a nail that was cinched (bent over) and this usually caused damage to the case or wood in the bending and clinching process. The use of the screw did not become widespread until around 1780 (after the Revolution). However, the new screws looked the same. The shank was made from a drawn wire, was more round, threads were more spiral-like, but still rough, there still was no point on the screw, and the slot was still very, very narrow.

Trying to date an object by the old screws is very difficult. However, in about 1860, a point was added to the screw. If the screw has a point, it was probably made after 1860.

Warning: Do not remove the old screws unless you have to. The old irregular thread will not hold when replaced and oversize screws will split the wood. If you replace the old screw, use a drop of white glue and replace as you marked the screw slot before removal.

The old adage: "Don't Screw Things Up". Be careful!


