

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE Meeting Minutes

November 1993 - Bob Boone presiding

The last Executive Committee meeting of '93 was held at Bob Boone's house on December 6th and came to order at 7:45PM.

Attending: Bob Boone, Marianne Duncan, Roy Clark, Bill Koppel, Dick Tremaine, Walt Hubrig, John Stohr, Tom Beales and Steve Fabes.

Treasurer's Report: Although not present, John McKeen furnished a copy of his report Highlights are: the CD becomes due in February and will be re-invested. Uncovered expenses incurred in the interim will be paid out of the checking account and replenished if necessary from the CD re-investment in February.

Awards Committee: Roy Clark reported that in addition to certificates of appreciation normally given to serving officers and Committee chairs at the year's end, that a different award certificate will be presented to guest speakers and other members who contribute outstanding activities at the time they occur. Bob Boone will obtain the certificates.

<u>Budget:</u> The actual expenses were mapped to the original 1993 budget and a proposed budget prepared for 1994 - the approval of the new budget was deferred to the 1994 Executive Committee.

Tool Library: Walt Hubrig and Bob Boone reported on the Tool Library. Following a meeting with a local attorney an appropriate lending agreement form has been developed. Discussions with an insurance broker about liability coverage continue. The Committee approved the Tool Library to proceed with acquiring up to \$1,000.00 of tools.

Meeting Locations: John Stohr reported that the meeting room at Civic Bank had been reserved for the Sunday and Friday meetings for the entire year (1994). John reported that the Civic bank facility was not considered large enough for the Sunday meetings and that he was studying other site options.

<u>Bulletin:</u> Steve Fabes will replace Tom Beales as the Bulletin Editor. Roy Holman and John Stohr will assemble, print and mail.

January 1994 - Bill Koppel presiding

The first Executive Committee meeting of 1994 was held at Bill Koppel's home on January 11th.

Budget: The Committee approved the Chapter's 1994 Operating budget as follows;

The Committee discussed splitting up the CD in order to stagger the maturity.

<u>Program:</u> The Committee decided that speakers at future Chapter programs should receive a Chapter pin, a Chapter year-long membership and a certificate of appreciation.

The traditional August program, the Ugly Clock contest, Cookie Bake and White Elephant Sale will be moved to the June meeting (6/12/94) to help members who would otherwise miss this great program due to vacation conflicts.

The Program Chair is seeking members who will present a short "show-and-tell" at the Sunday meetings.

The Committee wants a greater participation on the Display aspect of the programs and will seek greater member assistance.

Meeting Location: The use of the current Civic Bank facility for the Sunday programs will continue until a suitable alternative can be found - Committee members are working on this as the number one priority.

Pendulum Length

Note: This doesn't qualify as an article but it is pretty useful.

Many French clocks came with a measure of the pendulum length marked on the plate - I am still researching the rationale for this - I know the French loose a lot of important things (wars etc.) but the extent of pendulum loss is much more complex than first appears.

On the back plate there are often two numbers separated by a mark - usually the makers emblem. e.g. 4*8

These numbers are two length measures - pounces and lignes - just like feet and inches.

One POUNCE equals 27 millimeters
One LIGNE equals 2.26 millimeters

In the above example - a plate marked 4*8 - the length computes as follows:

4 times 27mm = 108mm 8 times 2.26mm = 18.08mm

One inch = 25.4mm

Total

126.08 divided by 25.4 = 4.96inches = length of the pendulum

126,08mm

Incidentally - the length of a pendulum is measured from the center of gravity of the assembled pendulum (the point at which it balances on a knife edge) to the point where the suspension spring flexes through the pendulum chops. Does anyone know the adjustment to make when there is silk thread and no suspension spring?

- #004 Bells for the strike were rare after 1900. (PR)
- #005 "Ligmum vita" looks like walnut but never needs oiling
 McBeaths in Berkeley carry it. (RMc)
- #006 To clean celluloid use a sweet oil olive, vegetable also Liquid Gold but never a mineral oil or an abrasive.

- #007 #0000 steel wool is good for a satin finish on plates then back into the cleaner put a magnet in the tank. (SF)
- #008 Cleaning wood and preserving the patina try Sarah's Brew. Quarter cup-o' boiled linseed oil, quarter cup-o' turpentine, third cup-o' Ivory Snow (pure soap powder with no phosphorus) add warm water to make a quart. Use right away or let it sit for a few days will keep for several months. Use with #0000 steel wool wipe dry, do not wash next day finish off with Liquid Gold. (SR)

The tips offered in the bulletin are often so simple/basic that it amazes me still that ".... I did not know that!"


