

Education:

Much discussion on continuing the Wednesday evening adult education Clock Repair class run for several years by Royal English and recently taken over by his son Wayne English. The Spring class starting in March will be Wayne's last. A possible new instructor was unable to get the required teaching credentials due to a European administered vaccine producing uncertain test results in the US screening process. "The Fusee"

For many of our members the fusee device used for small clock movements and watches by the early clock makers may be strange and sound complicated and perhaps it is - somewhat....

When the new steel mainspring came on the market, it revolutionized the watch and clock industry. Clocks and their cases could now be made much smaller and could sit on tables and mantels. Early small clocks were called "table clocks". The major impact was that hanging weights for a "power source" were no longer needed. However, the heavy weights continued to be used in the tall cased clocks as was the custom.

......But, the new steel springs had a problem. A major problem. As the spring unwound in running the clock or the watch movement, the new spring gradually lost power and the time-piece could not keep accurate time. The fusee was the answer to maintain the power from the spring.

The fusee is described as a grooved, cone shaped pulley. It is located close to the mainspring barrel. A small chain is hooked to the bottom of the fusee and to the outside of the spring barrel. The fusee is grooved so that the chain (or gut or steel wire) can wind evenly in the grooves on the fusee. The chain will also come off the fusee in an even manner as a result of these grooves on the fusee. As the mainspring barrel turns the fusee chain unwinds from the fusee grooved cone and begins to wind back onto the outside of the mainspring barrel. This coned shaped pulley winding the chain on the main barrel provides for an even, uniform source of power and makes possible an accurate time-piece.

Note: There is record of Thomas Harland, a clock maker from England bringing a fusee cutting machine with him when he sailed to America from England in 1773.

Also on p58 of the NAWCC February Bulletin there is a picture of a fusee.
