

Looking ahead to Diablo Valley's next meeting on Sunday, October 8, Jack Coulter will continue his lecture on "Clock Escapements and How They Work". He started the lecture at our last April 2000 Meeting. For your homework and future reference on escapements, check back to the June 2000 Bulletin, Pages 8 & 9, which lists Jack's "Escapement Bibliography". Does everyone save and file their old Diablo Valley Bulletins? What a great source of clock and watch information they contain, and who knows, they might just save you research time, tomorrow, next month, or next year.

I want to share with you a visit Carolyn and I made in early August to a Preview Event and Opening at the new and almost completed Chabot Space and Science Center in the Oakland Hills. There is nothing like it in the country. It is a multi-million dollar vast project. An affiliate now with the Smithsonian Institution, it contains the most advanced equipped Planetarium, MegaDome Theater, learning centers, labs, space exhibits, and much, much more.

The three telescopes, 8inch, 20inch, and the new 36inch (open in 2001) will all be available to the public and Oakland School children. The new 36inch telescope will be the largest in the country with public access. I would highly recommend you visit and/or become a member of this special and unique center.

This complex replaces the second Chabot Observatory, built at the turn of the century (directly on the Hayward Fault) in the Leona Park area of East Oakland. The original Observatory was in Downtown Oakland, founded by East Bay pioneer, Anthony Chabot, for the school children and citizens of Oakland. First moved to escape the encroaching city lights, and later, for more encroaching lights and the fault, the new Center now is situated in the Redwood Regional Park area, away from the city.

Back to our visit, Carolyn and I were in the Planetarium Theater waiting for the show to begin and in walked Diablo Valley Chapter member Tom Beales with his 90-year-old father and members of his family who sat next to us. A most pleasant surprise! When the program started, the Director spoke about the new Center, and told us there was a special family in the audience that he wished to honor, a family which descends from the Chabot Observatory's first Director, Mr. Burckhalter. Tom Beales and his family stood up!

How amazing, I grew up knowing about Burckhalter School on Burckhalter Avenue in East Oakland and now it all came together. Burckhalter, director and educator, was Tom Beales' grandfather. Also, Tom Beales' brother, Alan, who was also there, was someone Carolyn and I had known for over 30 years, and one of our five children had baby-sat for Alan's children when they lived in our neighborhood. I had not connected Alan Beales and Tom Beales. Maybe we can persuade Tom to tell us the "Whole Story" at a future meeting. In the meantime, please visit this remarkable Center. It's a very "Clock-Like" place for NAWCC people.


PICTURES FROM OUR AUGUST (SUNDAY) PICNIC




