Hello Everyone,

At last we are welcoming Spring and all the new life and growth it brings. This Spring we also experienced a great loss to our Chapter and a personal loss to many of our members. I would like to dedicate my message this month, to Tony Prasil:

It is with great sadness that I announce Anthony Prasil's passing. Tony was a NAWCC member for 57 years. Because of his valuable contributions in the field of horology and to the NAWCC, Tony became a Fellow in 1989. He served as Secretary to Chapter 13 for 8 years; Vice President of our club for 4 years and President for 3 years. He was also the curator of the Hoffman Clock Museum for several years. Tony said, "The best job in the world was given to me – curator of a clock museum."

Tony's penchant for horology started at a young age. As a child, he got his father's old watches to take apart. After receiving an Erector Set, he then learned to put things together. The first time Tony acquired a clock that didn't run - he took it apart and worked to repair the clock. He succeeded. The clock began operating and so began a passion for horology. While antiquing with his wife in the 1960s, Tony met a clock enthusiast who invited him to a Chapter 13 meeting...and the rest is history.



The October 1987 NAWCC Seminar was held in Rochester, New York. One of the highlights of the seminar was an exhibit of New York State clocks at the Rochester Museum and Science Center. Clocks and watches were on display, many on loan from members of Chapter 13 and Chapter 55. Three thousand people, including school children, viewed this exhibit. 

Tony served as Chairman of the workshops for the 1989 National Convention in Buffalo. Anthony J Prasil April 1, 2019 at the age of 96

Tony and Georgiana Prasil headed the design committee that created Chapter 13's outstand-

ing banner for display at the 1993 National Convention in Dallas, Texas.

His immeasurable knowledge was a gift Tony shared with everyone who

had the pleasure of knowing him. In addition, he was very generous – donating not only time but also material goods to our Chapter. He presented more than 100 lectures. All of Tony's contributions were substantial and



greatly appreciated.

Tony had the knack to create an interest in people (young and old alike) in the field of horology. For many years he participated the Science Exploration Days at St. John Fisher College in Rochester, making it fun for children and adults to learn.

Not very long ago, while recuperating at a local nursing facility, Tony was recruiting an employee to become a new member for our club – not bad for a 96-year-old! Tony also successfully completed the Cryptogram Puzzle #104 without the help of a computer, dictionary, etc.

Tony lived with his parents in Buffalo, New York. He studied at Cornell University and graduated Summa cum laude with a degree in Electrical Engineering. Tony married Georgiana in 1944 and together they raised four remarkable children. They made Rochester their home.

Tony started his profession as an electrical engineer at the Eastman Kodak Company in 1945. He designed secret military devices. His career at Kodak spanned many decades.

Tony was an active member of the Downtown United Presbyterian Church for 70 years, serving in several capacities.

Tony Prasil is predeceased by his wife and great-granddaughter. His is survived by his children, Ann (Philip) Karam, William Prasil, Marilyn (Guillermo) and Janet (Arthur) Newton. Tony is also survived by his grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Along with his family,

Tony leaves a host of colleagues and friends who were so fortunate to have known him and who will miss him immensely.
