
Our January program will feature Jim Burghart. Jim will present woodworks repair skills. Please bring in your woodworks movements with any questions for Jim.





A Fundraising Success: The Lockport Tower Clock



Lockport tower clock to be restored with help of Rotary Club

PROJECT: City man handling work has fixed clocks in Independence Hall, old Erie County Hall.

Over the past 45 years, Chuck Roeser has restored iconic public clocks across the world, from Independence Hall in Philadelphia to the Erie County Hall in Buffalo. His work has a horologist — a maker and fixer of clocks — has taken him across the American West and Europe, where he was restored to working order the sort of clocks that are centerpieces of campuses and city squares. Yet for much of his time in the trade, the hands



firm FensterhäldfiChuck Roeser, owner of Essence of Time, has restored public clocks around the world, including clocks in Philadelphia's Independence Hall and Bufffalo's former Erie County Hall. His next project: get the clock at Main and Pine streets in Lockport to keep time, accurately, once again.

on his own hometown's most historic tower clock, at Main and Pine streets, have not accurately kept the time. But Roeser will soon change that. Over the next year, he will make the repairs to get the nearly century-old clock ticking, accurately, once more. "Lockport is a very historic town; we've got a lot of history here," Roeser said. "It's as shame to let the clock deteriorate to the point it is now."

The Rotary Club of Lockport is leading the project, funding the work with about half club funds and half private donations and grants, including from the Oath Community Benefit Fund and \$3,000 in Niagara County casino monies. Club Sgt.-At-Arms Steven Cotten said the restoration will cost about \$38,500, along with various incidental costs.

The club is restoring the tower clock as part of its centennial celebrations next spring, (though it likely won't be finished until next October or November). The club was chartered in May 1919, and the clock was built — manufactured by O.B. McClintock Co., of Minneapolis — and erected in 1920.

But club vice president Cynthia Cotten said the they had not considered the clock's nearly-shared centennial, but simply felt the restoration was long overdue. The club is also planning to celebrate its centennial with new signage for the in-the-works playground, named in honor of Civil Rights pioneer Aaron Mossell, east of the Washburn and South streets intersection. "It's right at the edge of the locks historic district; people come up and see this eyesore," Cynthia Cotten said. "We thought, it's about time somebody get this fixed." Cynthia Cotten said they were also inspired to take on the project because of Roeser, a lifelong Lockportian who practices an increasingly rare craft. "It was kind of serendipitous that he was doing this right in Lockport," Steven Cotten said.

When the clock was erected at Main and Pine streets in 1920, it was operated by an electric controller located in the basement of what was then the Niagara County National Bank. The bank, along with the clock, was purchased by the Midland Marine Trust Company in 1951, and later by HSBC in 1980 (though the Midland Marine name remained). Sometime in the 1980s, Roeser said, the original controlled was removed. "The electric clock movements in there now, none of them really work," Roeser said.

Accounts vary on when the clock stopped functioning properly. The Cottens say the clock has not worked in at least 20 years. Niagara County Deputy Historian Craig Bacon said the clock stopped reading time accurately and consistently around the late 90s. The bank closed in 1999, and was later taken over by Niagara County Community College. The county took over the building in April 2015, and in May 2017, transferred it to the the Niagara Orleans Board of Cooperative Educational Services.

Roeser plans to install a digital controller inside the clock, which will operate the analogue hands. He also plans to add lighting for nighttime reading, and a sound-system that will chime carols on the quarter-hour. The club has yet to decide which songs it will play. The exterior will also be refurbished and coated with copper to prevent future rusting. Steve Cotten said that in 1920, copper was depleted because of World War I. Wherever possible, original materials will be used. "It'll look very similar to when it was manufactured," Roeser said.

Some aspects of the restoration may remain a mystery. Steven Cotten said they will not know the condition of the clock's base until they crack open the concrete and get a look inside. He is hopeful they can remove the clock and begin the restoration before the winter cold blows in. Should all go as planned, by this time in 2019, pedestrians on Main Street can check the time as they cross by Pine Street — just as Lockportians did 98 years ago. Cynthia Cotten hopes that the restoration will revive interest in what she considers a downtown icon. "I think there are people who haven't grown up in Lockport and say it's just a clock. But for people who've grown up here, it's an iconic piece. When you go down Main Street, you see the clock," she said.

"It caught your eye," she added. "It stood witness to 98 years of Lockport history." And with a thorough restoration, it could stand for another 98 years or more, ticking away the time minute by minute, hour by hour.

Mike meet Kevin Cole at a Kelly Schultz auction about 2 years ago and was invited to attend a Chapter 13 meeting and has been coming ever since. He also sets up booths at the North Tonawanda Old Chapel and the Lewiston Antique Mall in Sanborn, NY. Mike loves his clocks but is also interested in the mid century modern antiques and collectibles.

Mike is also happy that his younger daughter is interested in the clocks and wants to learn everything when he is repairing. It is nice to see young people interested in our hobby, maybe Mike will have a partner in the clock shop when he retires.
