Since there were visitors and new members present, everyone introduced themselves and gave a brief synopsis of what their horological interests included. It was good to see Mr. Reifsnider and Mr. Eric Kramer in attendance and well on the road to recovery. There was no new business to discuss by any of the Officers. Our program for the evening was presented by Ms. Sherry Kemp,

an exceptional local artist, who gave a presentation on "Reverse Painting and Stenciling In Clock Restoration". Ms Kemp started going to auctions when she was 13 years of age and stated her father bought many items, some of which needed repairs. She became interested in assisting with repairs and



developed an exceptional talent in reverse painting on glass as well as stenciling on splats and columns. She carves and repairs paw feet, as well as restores wooden or metal dials with Roman or Arabic numerals. She provided samples of some of her restorations, and as expected, they were beautifully done. Ms.

Kemp works in pen and ink, oil, or casein. She brought two chairs that she had repaired then meticulously stenciled. Copies of actual stencils she used were passed around while she explained how each piece had to be individually made, cut out, then carefully placed. She made it sound easy, but believe



me, I am sure it is not as easy she makes it sound!!!

The program made a very enjoyable evening for all members and introduced us all to a good reference for us for future use.



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Tic Toc Tech Tips

Clocks, Art, Restoration, Repair

One of the questions about restoration, repair and working on clocks is, now that I've got the movement working, what do I do with the case? I don't relish case restoration but it is part of the process because I find most people do not enjoy seeing a bare movement sitting on a table ticking away without the case. At our last meeting we had the pleasure of listening to Sherry Kemp, a well known local professional artist, discuss some of her techniques and work associated with clocks. She displayed a sample of reverse glass painting she did especially for our meeting and discussed how it was made. The painting is shown in the photo



below. This was a framed picture but with appropriate sizing could have been a tablet for a clock. The Glass painting starts with a transparent primer on the glass followed by details that appear in the forefront of the picture then working to the back of the scene with the last painting being that part of the scene in the back-

ground. This is the opposite of how one paints a canvas where one paints the background and then works forward painting the forefront details last. She then coats the back of the painting with a final coat of paint (usually black) which also helps to protect the painting from nicks and scratches.

If you are thinking about tackling the job of painting a tablet for one of your clocks, my general advice would be to contact Sherry at 301-898-0118 and have a professionals do it. Sherry has said she was available for such work if any of our members have a need for a reverse painted tablet. She also will do stenciling on splats and columns on clock cases. The photo below is a



clock she stenciled for one of our members on a mirror clock case. She also displayed two chairs that showed the results of her stenciling technique. Some of the older types of the medium used for the stenciling is scarce and hard to find, but newer types are available at art supply stores such as Michaels and Hobby Lobby stores along with material to make the stencils and brushes to apply it. Pounces can be made as needed by enclosing media in a fine mesh cloth. The stenciling is relative sim-

ple but the tricky part that takes some practice is applying it to obtain the shading and density variations (in the right places) to give it depth and beauty.

The art stores also have the supplies for painting on glass (or ceramic). There is the primer coating and then the various colors in either opaque or transparent media. I have heard it suggested that we wash the glass with vinegar before applying anything to it. This supposedly cleans off any undesirable residues that might cause the paint not to stick. Gentle soap and water might do just as well, just don't leave any residue. If you plan to attempt reverse painting, my first suggestion is to practice on an old picture frame glass.



There are two approaches that can be used. First is the freehand painting and second is the use of stencils. The NAWCC Library has booklets of old stencil patterns from the past (Clock Decorating Stencils of Mid-19th Cen-



tury Connecticut) that you can check out and copy.

If they are still in print, they may be available in the NAWCC Museum Gift Shop. If you use these patterns and stencil them on where overlapping colors are involved, stencil anything that goes in front on first and work your way to the back of the scene. The painting is done on the side of the glass facing inside the clock and the stencil is placed on the inside as well.

If you plan to freehand paint it, start with the details, highlights and parts of the image that will be in the forefront of the picture. And work to the back. If you wish to sketch it on paper first then place the sketch on the front of the glass as a guide for what you intend to paint, remember to sketch it as a mirror image of what you want to show looking at the front of the tablet. Paint the fine (front) details first as they show through from the sketched image. As you paint them on the glass they will obscure the sketch, but the second level will still show through and so forth until you have completed all layers. The risk or difficulty with this technique is that the sketch attached to the glass does not let you occasionally turn the tablet over and see how your work is progressing. Some people forego the sketch and actually position the tablet in front of a mirror so they can see what they are achieving as they go. Another technique is to make a pen and ink outline sketch and tape it to the tablet. Then with a fine brush, paint in a black outline to match the sketch and then remove the outline sketch and finish the color fill, using the mirror technique. As Sherry points out, when painting on a canvas, if you goof, you can paint over it. You can't do that with watercolors and you really can't do that in a reverse glass painting. So get it right as you go.



One other application I would like to mention is; I have a French clock with a case using ceramic panels. Some were missing. I obtained some white ceramic tile of the correct thickness and cut them to shape to fit in the clock case. I then called on my daughter, also a professional artist,

to use the existing panels and art to



create replacement painting on the new panels. She used the medium designed for painting on

glass to generate matching painted panels. (See photos) We discussed painting the ceramic and firing it in a kiln but decided this would work well and be much simpler. I have found this to work quite satisfactorily. I also discussed the problem of broken feet and missing splat decorations with Sherry. She said she has carved new feet and case decorations and replaced missing or broken parts on wooden cases. She can also repair many broken metal cases. If you are facing problems restoring a favorite case, contact her to see if she can help you. She is located in the Fredrick area.
