Minutes of Freestate Chapter 141 Meeting, March 9, 2011

The Freestate 141 Chapter Meeting of March 9, 2011, started with a small mart followed by a great meal. The meeting was called to order by President Lou Orsini with the sad news of the passing of both Doug Schlotterbeck and Joe Lubozynski. Word was also received of Bob Edwards passing. A moment of silence was observed in their honor. The Treasurer, Neil Armine reported a current balance of approximately \$2300. Al Bush, our Newsletter coordinator, ensured everyone is receiving the newsletter. Bob Butler reminded our membership about the Woodsboro Meeting which will be held on 4/16/2011. Speakers will be Rory De Mesy and Chuck Roeser who furnished and restored a Howard No, 3 tower clock movement and new dials for the rebuilt tower of the "Old Red Courthouse" in Dallas, Tx.

The meeting was centered on "Show and Tell" which resulted in many unusual objects and stories. Lou Orsini started off with 2 photos of clock repairs-one using a penny to extend life of the pivot instead of bushing the hole; the other using a pin and scotch tape to avoid bushing the hole. One was a Geneve 17 jewel watch and the other a platinum watch on which he only changed the bands! Inside the case he found a letter of the only remaining family member (92 years old) of the Reichard family who originally owned the clock. What a treasure! 

Tic Toc Tech Tips

Reference Book Tips Part II

As I have mentioned before, I have accumulated a number of books in my horological library and have found it necessary to make myself a list to preclude my buying doubles. For the last Tech Tips, I broke then into more or less three groupings since all of them would not fit into my constraint of one page for the Tips. The previous article dealt with identification, history, and price. This time I will cover primarily movements and repair. The last tip in this series will cover other related but important areas. Some of the books and references overlap two or all three areas mentioned.

If a question comes up, I like to be able research it quickly. One of my goals was to organize my library so I could rapidly find the topic of concern. On my computer data base I plan to add a "Keywords" column to each book and article item to further enhance my listing. Some of the keywords as listed the last time will be: Cases, Clocks, Escapements, Formulas, Handbooks, History, Instruction, Identification, Levers, Movements, Price, Processes, Refinishing, Repair, Tables, Theory, Tips, Tools, Torque, Stress, Specifications, Watch and Wood. Often these books have additional information in them about

the clocks, watches, tools and materials or history. Those listed above are primarily useful in working on clocks or watches.



One of the things I haven't seen often published is some of the offbeat attempts to repair timepieces. For your amusement I show a couple of photos of attempts to "repair" some clock movements. The first uses a scrap of brass soldered to the plate to force a pivot back into posi-

tion and provide support where bushing has

worn away. The second one shows the replacement of a suspension spring with a piece of flexible plastic. At least it was flexible when they put it in. When I bought it from the lady in the antique store, she was feverishly trying to get it running to demonstrate.



strate to me that the clock worked. Then there was the gentleman in the antique store that was bragging to me how he did such a great job of cleaning movements in his clocks before placing them on the shelf for sale. He had a galvanized bucket of kerosene that he dipped his movements in, then shook off the excess and let them drain and dry. If they needed it he would put some sewing machine oil on the pivots. He said, "it is the white kind". When it was dry he would put it back into the case and adjust the time. He cleans all his clocks before he sells them. As for oil, there's the person who believes in oil, lots of oil. I cease to be amazed or surprised at what I see when I open a clock.
