Minutes of Freestate Chapter 141 Meeting, May 11, 2011

The Freestate Chapter 141 meeting of 11 May 2011 was opened with a small Mart followed by the usual great buffet meal. President Lou Orsini distributed 8x10 photos to people who participated in the Show And Tell at our April meeting. It was announced that our share of the Woodsboro Regional was \$97.28 which was a great show. The National Meeting will be at Overland Park, KS, and should be great fun. Please try to attend.

Tom Mostyn was scheduled to present the program but had a conflict and was unable to attend. Bob Rothen took Tom's notes, pictures, and information and gave the program "Mystery, Novel, and Fantasy Clocks". First presented was the Swinger Clock, so called because it looks like the pendulum and clock swing together. Next was the Norveau Clock which came from

a little village in France started by 2 brothers in 1680 who were blacksmiths. The clock usually chimed twice: once on the hour, and again 5 minutes past the hour. Also unusual is that it has a vertical snail. Next was a novelty clock that has only one hand. The mechanism is in the base. There is also a mystery clock with one hand. The part that turns is sandwiched between 2 pieces of glass. A "Turtle of the Pond" clock has a bar magnet underneath the "pond" that tells the time. A Flame Lamp has a small reservoir inside that holds oil or kerosene. A shadow produced by the flame inside a glass globe marked with the hours reflects the time. There was an "Animated Clock" that appears to be sitting under a tree, complete with a bird, bee, and waterfall. The clock tells time but the other parts are worked by a separate mechanism. The Windmill Clock contains both a clock and a barometer. The clock had to be wound. There is a small door which opens below to operate the barometer. Tom's Brequet watch was special because it was made the Brequet himself. Brequet only signed the watches he actually made. The signature was signed faintly in the porcelain dial under the twelve. The Rolling Clock is a clock that rolls on a shelf with a slightly inclined ramp. It takes the clock 8 days to roll down the ramp. The dial always stays in the correct position due to the clock rolling on its' axis which provides the power. After the conclusion of the program, it was agreed that Bob did a great presentation due to the detailed information provided by Tom. Together they provided a delightful presentation.

President Lou Orsini closed the meeting by reminding the members of the upcoming picnic, scheduled on 26 June at Roger and Romaine Reifsnider's home. Meeting was over at 8:45 pm


TIME: 11:00 - 2:00 P.M. FOOD SERVED @12:00 P.M.

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Tic Toc Tech Tips

Reference Book Tips Part III

This **Tech Tip** concludes the listing of books I use in my Horological pursuits. This portion deals with some books useful in the shop work both on movements and cases. I have never been a great fan of case work but it is necessary and often the major part of a repair or restoration. Some of the books on this list deal with highly technical aspects of the mechanics associated with the movements but can be quite useful when you are buried deeply in the solution of a stubborn problem. I also threw in "How to Clean Everything" which may be out of print but you might find it on the internet. I found some of its suggestions clever and some I might be cautious about using.

I don't have a photographic memory and there is no way I can remember completely all the things I have read. As my memory becomes more Senior, it is a valuable asset to be able to quickly refer back to information I have accumulated and refresh my memory. To me knowing where to find needed information is most valuable, thus I share some of those resources with you in hopes that it might be of value to you as well.
