Minutes of Freestate Chapter 141 — 13 November, 2013

Freestate 141 held our regular meeting on 13 November 2013. Meeting was opened by President Lou Orsini (after the Mart and excellent meal) with announcements by several members— the first being George Hudson. He stated Chapter 11 would be meeting in the parking lot in Columbia, PA to go to Marietta. The members will be provided a tour of the Tower Clock in the Town Hall, a Reeves NY 1847, which was recently restored. There will be several steps to climb to see the works, dial and then bell.

President Orsini announced the answer to the riddle in the last newsletter was "Jesse Coleman".

Wheeler Green displayed a black light that he used to detect cracks, repairs, breaks, tears, etc. that cannot be seen by the naked eye. Black lights can be purchased from several different sites at a cost of about \$8.00. It was stressed that these lights should not be shined in anyone's eyes, it could possibly cause damage.

Our speaker was Markus Harris, Director of Communications, NAWCC. The presentation was: "NAWCC ONLINE". This program is meant to share the Horological Resources of NAWCC with the digital world. Program opened with remarks about one of the charter members of NAWCC, Ernest A. Cramer, NAWCC Charter Member No. 00003. Mr. Cramer was a seminal contributor to the early manifestations of the Bulletin, all of which are now online. He discussed that communication is paramount between NAWCC and its members. The Internet is the NAWCC—members, staff, and others doorway to the world. The Internet is used to provide decades of information, resources, and archival materials as well as info on classes, workshops, and instructional videos. NAWCC makes computer databases available to provide the member with use of the website, resource center, calendar, and all horological resources.



Mr. Harris went over the procedures to Login to the NAWCC web site and how the site worked, plus how to access various areas. He stated archives were available dating from 1943-present, containing articles and research material. Our message board is huge and is available to all persons, not only members. Mr. Harris emphasized that "others" who had access to the information on the site CANNOT access any information on or about NAWCC members. He discussed the Video Library with hundreds of instructional films available on most any horological subject; "Webinar" facilities are available. The Horological School still has its facility and is used to give live classes so people can interact by asking questions, etc. NAWCC also has the largest Horological library in the country with a lending library containing books that can be checked out by members—they are mailed out on the "honor system" assuming they will be returned. You can call, email, or mail a request for any of the 12,000 historical items. You can access online to get all information on each item.

The entire presentation was interesting and provided in depth information for members to use.





Tic Toc Tech Tips Black light

We thank Wheeler Green for providing us this tip about Black Light. Wheeler brought this to our attention at our last meeting. First I should emphasize caution about looking at UV (Black Light). Since the eye cannot recognize UV in the Black Light range our eye does not know how intense the light (radiation) is and thus your iris does not contract to protect itself. This is one of the reasons you are informed not to look at the Sun during an eclipse without eye protection. In the case of the Sun there is not only Black Light (UV) but Infra Red (IR) light being radiated which we cannot see as well. IR is on one end of the visible spectrum of light and UV on the other end.

First of all light is described as a type of electromagnetic energy similar to radio waves, TV signals, heat and xrays. These waves can deflect, bend, interfere, be interfered with, and react with objects they strike. These light waves are made up of individual particles, called protons. They are both energy and matter. You have heard of Einstein's equation, E=mc². Without getting too deep into light theory let me say various wave lengths of visible light strike a surface reflecting a color determined by the content of the surface material and energy absorbed and reflected. There is an additive and a subtractive method of mixing light to obtain a range of color. With additive; if you shine a red, green and blue light on the same spot on a white surface it will appear as white light; a red light will make the white surface appear red, green light green, etc. With subtractive; if you mix a paint pigment of yellow, magenta and blue-green (cyan) you will get black. This depends on how the pigments are excited as photons of a particular wave length strike them. The photo below shows the spectrum and you will note that UV covers the spectrum from about 500 Angstroms to 3900 Angstroms. An Angstrom



is 1.0 x 10-10 meter, a very small measurement. Now we get to the interesting part of using Black Light. When light strikes some minerals and chemicals it will excite them to glow or give off a color different from the light itself. As with Rudolph the Red Nose Reindeer, "You might even say it glows." And it does. Wheeler Green has provided us with some pictures of this phenomenon in the following photographs. You can observe the results of different black lamps when used to look at a clock with an enameled dial. Photo #1 was taken under normal light. Photo #2 used a portable fluorescent UV



light while Photo #3 & #4 used UV LED light. Figure #4 is a close up of #3. Figure #5 used a portable fluorescent UV close up while figure #6 uses the light at a different angle. The camera was used on a tripod since the automatic exposures were longer. Photo in #6 was enhanced on the computer to brighten and increase the contrast to make any cracks stand out. This is another tool to help you evaluate certain aspects (face, coatings, old vs. new paper, etc.) of a clock/watch and not meant to be a catchall.

Various types of black lights are shown above. The first



photo #7 shows a small portable flashlight with an SB4W black light tube in it. Photo #8 has an SB4W tube also and both operate off of 4 AA cells (6 V DC). Wheeler Green has placed a F4T5BLB lamp in the light in Photo #8 and finds it to work a little better. However, he purchased a (light emitting diode) LED Black Light and feels it may be even more effective. I should note that a F4T5 lamp bulb is also offered that produces a white fluorescence. To be sure to obtain the Black Light version it should be specified as F4T5BLB. The BLB stands for Black Light Blue. With the BLB, it has the tube made as a filter to block out the visible light and transmits the UV. Photo #9 above is a decorative novelty Black Light usually used to illuminate posters having ink in fluorescent colors. Photo #10 is a medical UV Germicidal light source using mercury vapor. Black Light and is useful in killing germs with about 15 seconds of exposure. I have used the light also to cure watch crystal cement epoxies. Photo #11 is a shop tool with a blue LED lamp to illuminate the work which coincidentally has BL properties. Many of these are available on the internet by searching for Black Light. We thank Wheeler Green for a very interesting tech tip.
