Minutes of Freestate Chapter 141 – 8 January, 2014

Vice President Robert Rothen called the meeting to order expressing the regrets of President Lou Orsini who was unable to attend. Bob reminded the membership of the soon to close, "Majestic Time" exhibit at the NAWCC headquarters in Columbia, PA. The exhibit is the largest exhibit ever of Thomas Tompion's clocks, watches, and sundials. The exhibit was to commemorate the 300th year of his death (1639-1713). Alex and Ray Snouffer had been to view the exhibit and suggested seeing the video on the quarter hour repeater.

The theme of the first meeting of the year is always "Show and Tell". Wheeler Green demonstrated a LED Black Light. He suggested checking the Internet for very reasonably priced units.

George Tresansky informed members of the several "Letters to the Editor" in the January/February Watch & Clock Bulletin. The letters contained many differing opinions regarding Tom Mostyn's program on "Cleaning Wood Movements". Tom's program was based on his years of experience and success restoring woodworks clocks.

Neil Amrine had a display of small clocks with windup movements and made the statement that most of these were not made to be repaired. These are found in many different case types - porcelain, metal, etc. These clocks should be purchased only if the movement is running and you are drawn to the beauty or uniqueness of the case. (or if your wife wants it!).

Mel Kornspan showed a picture of a clock offered by the Bradford Exchange. This was an unusual clock as it was made like an Egyptian temple with many moving pieces with Nefertiti coming out on the hour. Mel collects American Clocks as well as a few French clocks. Mel first collected clocks with wood movements but switched to metal spring driven later. One example he showed was an 8-day Ogee with reverse painting. Mel then surprised us with a demonstration of a gift he received from a "friend". It was a Semi-Truck/Trailer with alarm as well as a snooze alarm with bright flashing lights and loud obnoxious honking. (Snooze Alarm?).

Darcy Bertelmann discussed ogee artwork by William Bennett Fenn. His



and those less skilled did the actual painting. (Edit note: The Library at the Museum in Columbia has two books of the actual Fenn stencils that can be checked out for your perusing.)

Frank Goad showed and discussed two Illinois 16 size watches. The first watch was a 16 size that Illinois produced about 1896. This one had a private label "A.E.Rogers, Scranton PA". This watch was bought mostly as scrap out of a "junk" box many years ago. Frank finally gathered all the missing pieces and put it together. The second watch was Illinois Model 5 Sangamo - the highest grade Illinois watch made for railroad use. It is a Model 5, 21 jewel, Gothic numerals with minor repairs. It works very well.

Tom Mostyn discussed Rolling Ball Clocks made by Congreve - who was an inventor, not a clockmaker. He was trying to solve the problems of the pendulum. He used a ball rolling down a zigzag-track to replace the pendulum. These clocks are not accurate at all. He called his invention the "Extreme Detached Escapement" and patented it in 1808. He hired Gravel and Tolkien to produce the first working version, which was presented to the Prince of Wales in 1808. Every model which has been produced have been unreliable timekeepers.

Meeting was dismissed with a reminder to always remember those who are serving our Country. Next meeting is 12 March 2014.





Horological Talk & Tips

NAWCC –Logging On To Your Member Account

The NAWCC has recently revamped our online presence, initiating a long term strategy to bring all of our online resources together with a unified look and feel. NAWCC.com now receives over two million visits a year, and all NAWCC members are granted special access to exclusive members-only website content via your member log in ID. Here are some quick tips and tricks for using our Member Website Resources:

If you don't have your NAWCC Member Log In information, you need only contact us at webmaster@nawcc.org and we will be happy to get your account set up. Once your account is ready, you can log in and start enjoying our main website Member features. In the upper right hand corner of our various webpages you will find a **Blue NAWCC LOG In button**.

What is the Blue NAWCC LOG IN button?

The NAWCC LOG IN button located at the top right of the NAWCC webpages provides NAWCC Members access to the "Members-Only" website Resources as well as account information and events.



How do I get a password for my log-in?

If you don't already have a password or have forgotten your password, there is a link on the log-in page you can use to reset your password. You can also call toll-free 1-877-255-1849 during business hours and press 5 for the Membership Group or email Kevin Osborne at kosborne@nawcc.org to request a password reset.

How do I log in?

Click the blue NAWCC LOG IN button to open the log-in page. Enter the email address you have on file with the NAWCC and your password. Then click the small LOGON button and you will be logged on. The homepage should re-open and the blue NAWCC LOG IN button will now appear orange LOG OUT.



How does it work?

Once you log in, you can go to any other page of the NAWCC (such as the Message Board, the 4Sale site, and the Community pages) and have full access without having to log onto each and every page.

I logged into the Main Site, but when I went to another section of the site, it said I wasn't logged in. What should I do?
When you log on to the NAWCC site (nawcc.org), the LOG

IN button turns orange and you are logged into the system. The single log-in works with all parts of our website... but sometimes, when crossing from one section of the site to another, it needs a little extra nudge from the user to force it to recognize that the user is logged onto all the sites. If you know you are logged in on the Main Site (nawcc.org) but then, when you go to another site (like the Message Board) the log in button is still blue, it means those subsites haven't yet recognized your log-in. Should this happen, simply click the blue log in button AGAIN. That should confirm the log-in and the blue button will turn orange.

To change your password:

Login and click on the [Members](#) link.

From the left hand Member Resources menu click on [My Account](#).

On the page that opens click ID & Password and change your password.

Please do not modify your Logon ID, only your password.

To access the Bulletins, Supplements, Videos and other scanned data online:

Once you have logged on, click on the [Resources](#) link from the right hand column of the front page.

If you're trying to access the NAWCC [Message Board](#), log in as above. Then click the Message Board link at the top of the page. If the NAWCC LOG IN button on the Message Board is still blue click it again. If you have created a message board account, the board should now recognize you.

To access and Register for the NAWCC4Sale site:

Logon and click on the [4Sale\\$NAWCC](#) link. Instructions to register on the site are attached.

To access the Community site:

Login and click on the [Community](#) link.

You can also view much of the Museum Collection from the [Museum Page](#).

Click the Museum Collection link at the left of the page and then click on Search the Collection.

[If you need to pay your dues, click on the Members](#) link.

Then under Membership in the left hand menu, click [Renew](#). Your invoice amount should be waiting there for you.

Click on Add to Cart and it will step you through the process.
