Our program was presented by David Grau about "Buying and Selling on eBay." When submitting information for <u>SELLING</u>, be sure to "bold" key information. *Subtitle - use if you have other important points to make. *14K Gold means 58.3% gold throughout - not plated, not gold filled. *It's not "rare" because someone says it is. *List in the correct category - subcategory. SELLING PHOTOS - *Great photos are an important part of the description

and will make you more money. Take as many photos as you can of any distinct feature. Use photo editor to make brighter, better, clearer.

SELLING DESCRIPTION - *Write so vivid an image of whatever you are selling that it is created in the reader's mind. Details! *Market the item such as "this clock uses the (blah - blah - blah) movement. This movement was also used in Abe Lincoln's favorite clock that he brought to the White House with him". *Describe the flaws as well as the great things. *Assume people will not read or misread what you write. Means great photos!! SHIPPING -* I only ship to ... If package is lost, you are out of money. Use insurance. If it is over \$200, request signature confirmation. If you pay 15% fee to eBay and/or PayPal on shipping as well on the item, be sure to keep this in mind when figuring the shipping cost. DO NOT TRY TO MAKE MON-EY ON SHIPPING! HOW MUCH - *Cost is meaningless to what people are looking for. *Look for similar items under "sold." *Condition, condition, condition. Is it all original? *Use "Buy It Now" or best offer. *"Buy It Now" should be higher than what you want for item but don't scare people off! *You can always relist. If item is worth what you are asking, don't drop price. *Some people raise the price if it doesn't sell the first time. LISTING SOFTWARE - *Turbo Lister is no longer available but there are other selling tools on eBay which are easy to use but you have less control. **DESCRIPTION** - Keep it simple. Photos, Photos - so look carefully. BUYING ON EBAY - *You are 100% protected by ebay. *Can't return because you don't like the clock or watch. *Our speaker usually only buys from U.S. or England. *Redial??? Check spacing, font, placement of 2nd hand, matte or glossy, Swiss or Switzerland. *Hands - hour, minute, second length, style, color. *Incorrect metal content/type in title. *Counterfeits. *Frankenwatches (put together from others). *Ask for more photos if needed - such as no photo of movement, case back (in and out), blurry photos. DO NOT buy unless you are willing to take a chance. *Ukranian watches are usually fabricated. *Check google for images of other examples of clocks and/or watches. *Check for what item sold for in the past on ebay. *Can you fix/clean what you are buying? Mr. Grau closed his very interesting and informative program by answering any and all questions. Members left this meeting with an increased knowledge of eBay and it's workings.

Meeting dismissed with a reminder to remember our military members serving around the world. Next meeting is 14 May 2015.



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Horological Talk & Tips

Power, Energy, and Friction


Today I would like to talk about power, energy, friction and things that effect the operation of timepieces. This is something that is in my mind any time I am working on a clock movement, particularly mechanical clock movements. When the spring or weight is wound up, energy is stored in it to power the clock. Most of these clocks are designed to run 30 hours, 8 days, 14 days, and 30 days or even 1 year. Some special clocks may be designed to run even longer. A movement that is to run 30 days, or more, or even 14 if they are a precision movement, has to be designed and built to conserve energy. Thus friction becomes an important factor. For those of you that were able to attend Chapter 141's meeting

March 14, 2012, Bob Rothen gave an excellent talk on "Tribology" dealing with this subject. (Fried Sausages and Bearing Damage, Werner Stehr & Klalus Dobler, available from Amazon.com). Things that contribute to that problem are poor lubrication/oiling which can relate to use of unreliable oils or oils that have hardened or caked, increasing the friction on the pivots.



Excessive oil is not good either. Excessive oil can allow the oil to run down the plate and "draw" the oil out of the oil sinks and from between the pivot and bushing leaving the pivot running metal to metal. Excessive oil can also mean a greater probability of collecting dust that finds its way into the pivot-bearing area and serves as an abrasive to wear the

pivot as well as the bushing. Ideally one would want a small meniscus between the pivot and the bushing, but more should not be needed. It is important that the oil retains its lubrication powers over an extended period and as most of you know, synthetic



oils have been developed for this purpose, many of which are very expensive.

A couple of years ago I participated in an NAWCC Webinar conducted by member Stephen Nelson covering Vienna regulators. Some of Stephens professional work involved



working with lubricants, so he was well qualified to address the subject. He indicated that he used Synthetic Mobile 1 (10W30) to oil the pivots on the Vienna regulators he services. He had one VR for over 10 years which he had serviced and oiled with Synthetic Mobile 1. Someone wanted to purchase it, so he decided he should service it first. When he started to clean it, he found it still had an oil meniscus around the pivots and the oil had

not hardened or caked. That was a good testimony for the oil.

He now recommends it as a good clock oil. While on the oil subject I should mention that for watch oil you

might want the Nye oil which has lower viscosity. Stephen gave us a chart showing viscosity of various oils. It shows the Nye synthetic oil with a viscosity number of 20 while that for Mobile 1 synthetic 5W-30 is listed at a value of 90. You will note that water is 1 centipoise @ 70°, in comparison; honey is about 2,000 and molasses about 5,000.

Oil is not the only factor. One of the VR clocks I was working on had a problem with wear on some of the levers that ride on cams or pin. Since the VR is a long run clock per winding, energy is conserved by polishing the cams and levers to reduce the sliding friction.

This clock had grooves on one of the levers where a pin impacts to lock it to a specific position, but it must slide off of at a later point in time. The clock movement did not have enough energy to slide the pin



past this point and as the lever attempted to rise past this point it stalled the clock. Once the groove was polished out the clock is still running well. You will note by the 3 grooves that previous repairers had repositioned the pin twice to circumvent the problem. The last one being on the very tip, it was now necessary to polish it out. This adjustment had likely been made by bending the pin.

Currently I am working on a clock whose main spring has, most likely, been in service from its beginning. The run time for a full wind of the spring was marginally satisfactory. Most of the parts for the movement seem to have been made by stamping. The results are that the cams and levers have a rough surface that can add friction where they slide against each other. By honing some of these surfaces with a stone I was able to obtain a much smoother operation and gain margin on the runtime per winding. I also noticed a quieter signal from my test instrument monitoring the clock timing.

While this movement is an 8 day clock, its construction is more in line with what I see on the old 30 hour kitchen clocks. It certainly reminded me of the importance of a well machined and lubricated movement.
