

Editors Note:

In the last edition of this newsletter I included pictures of an Alarm that I have acquired. I also ask for information on this clock.

Many of you responded and identified the maker as FMS or Friedrich Mauthe, Schwennigen of Germany. I wish to thank all that responded and include an e-mail I received from our German friend Uwe H. Peter (Alarm Clock Peter).

Hello Mr.Bob Linkenhoker,

I send you greetings from Germany. I am Wecker-PETER (Alarm-Clock-PETER).

Mr. Linkenhoker, you ask questions about an Alarm Clock in the newsletter. Your alarm clock is from the German producer FMS - Friedrich Mauthe, Schwennigen (Black-Forest). The alarm clock was produced after 1925. This type of eagle (company sign) on the dial was used starting in 1925.before then Mauthe used other eagle-pictures.

Please see my pictures. I send you also a picture from an old Mauthe-Cataloge. ca. 1910. The model name was "ORLANDO" which has different bells. It is possible, that Mauthe changed the type of bells later or the bells on your alarm clock was changed.

The dial is original. Produced by Mauthe in Germany for the Turkey Market. Mauthe exported clocks and alarm clocks worldwide, with many pieces going to Turkey.

I have many different examples of Mauthe-Alarm-Clocks. One model (name: ARENA) in German edition and another in edition for the foreign market with Turkish numbers on the dial.







Arena model with Turkish dial from Peter's Collection




Peters Arena clocks for domestic market




Close-up of Turkish dial




Note knurled ring that rotates outer Minute scale



Note slotted holes that allow bell to Rotate for loud or soft









7 1/4 inches tall including the ring

4 1/4 inch painted (not paper) dial

Clock has Parker hands

Knurled bezel turns counter-clockwise presumably to keep track of elapsed time

Lever on left side with three position scale marked 'Hour-Minute-Off'

Patented Feb 4 1908 and Dec.23, 1913

Slots in rear bell holes to allow rotation of the bell towards or away from the hammer to obtain Loud or Soft sound

Well made heavy case and movement

Time spring arbor has a geneva mechanism to control winding (allowing for only linear portion of spring to be used)

Dennis who is the author of "Legged Alarm Clocks" states he picked this item up on E-Bay and has never heard of the Yankee Wizard Clock Company or the Wizard model. He would like to know if any of our members have information on this model or the company. In doing an internet search I found four patents that were taken out by Edward Evereatt Gage of New York city that relate to this clock. These are patents number 878,371 issued on February 4, 1908, 937,232 issued on October 1909, 1.082,077 issued on December 23, 1013 and 1,088.978 issued on March 2, 1914.

It appears from the patents Mr. Gage was a principle in the Yankee Wizard Clock Company and its aim was to make a good quality alarm clock that could be set to the exact hour and minute (using the outer scale and knurled bezel) one wished it to alarm and could be also used as a countdown or elapsed time meter.

I also found two ads that were printed in the New York Tribune newspaper on May 5, 1918 and June 20,1919. Besides there was what we today would call an infomercial printed in the '1918 International Journal of Surgery':

"AN AID TO MEMORY

The "Yankee Wizard Clock" does not let you forget your appointments, safeguards your time in office practice and makes your minutes count.

Not only indispensable to the busy practitioner, but in the sick-room, giving a gentle notice to the attendant to administer medicines or observe other' directions.

The alarm clock has ordinarily been looked upon as a device for awakening one in the early morning with a loud noise. Indeed, that was its sole function until some mechanical genius conceived the idea of producing a clock that would ring softly, as in the sick-room or loudly as a morning rouser, at will, and that it could be set to ring at short or long intervals, almost to the second, for use in timing doses of medicine, for example, or the accurate measurement of laboratory processes, for checking labor costs in factory management, and in office routine. Such a remarkable timepiece is to be had in the Yankee Wizard Clock, advertised in our pages. The alarm-setting mechanism is on the face of the Yankee Wizard, thereby making it possible to set the alarm to ring within a maximum of five seconds of the time desired, and to repeat this process, if need be, at intervals of any number of hours, from 1 to 12 or any number of minutes of the hour, from 1 to 60.

The "Wizard" will be sent postpaid, promptly on receipt of price, \$5.00, with illuminated radium dial and hands (clearly discernable in a dark room) \$6.00. Yankee Wizard Clock Company, authorized agents, 18 Broadway, New York City, New York, U. S. A."

In checking our newsletters I did find that one of these clocks was advertised for sale in the 2004 Volume 3 issue.

TRAVEL ALARMS

A while back I received this email from member Glen Chambers.

'I have often wondered if the Chapter would be interested in Travel Alarm Clocks as I have a small collection of the inexpensive German variety through 15 Jewel Swiss, including Cyma, Looping, Jaeger, Gueblin, and Hamilton.

The Travel Clock pictured in figure 1 is one of my oldest and seems to date back to circa 1930. It is marked on the movement, Norwich Watch Co. seven jewels unadjusted, made in Switzerland and the alarm is powered from the single mainspring.'

Of course I replied that we surely are interested and here is a sample of the fine clocks he has in his collection.



Figure 1 Leaving the realm of Carriage clocks, the need for a light weight well protected clock was met with this leather cased circa 1930 one day alarm inscribed, Norwich Watch Co. Brevet Suisse on the movement. Power for the alarm is taken from the single mainspring.



Figure 3 Shows the above alarm with the back removed and the high grade of movement associated with the name Gubelin



Figure 2 With the advent of mass travel opportunities, miniaturization becomes popular with this Gubelin. The travel case is of leather and the clock is removable for ease of winding. It features a 15 jewel movement and runs for 8 days.



Figure 4 This unusual combination of the name Hamilton and a Travel clock features a leather case and a 15 Jewel movement that runs for 8 days. It appears to have been made in a Swiss associate factory just before the close of all Hamilton production in 1970.
