

I have seen these products for sale at the local regionals but since I personally specialize in Westclox haven't given them much attention. This will certainly change in the future.


Check out the text for the German made alarm. At 49 cents it looks like they didn't really push this produce but rather showed it in comparison to an American made produce. A flashback to an earlier time when American products were valued over foreign competition.

There is one more sheet included which is the instructions to set up the E. Ingram produced eight day National Call alarm.

One other interesting point. even though Montgomery Wards has gone through many changes in its life and in the late 20th century closed all it's retail stores, even going through a bankruptcy, that today it exist as an on-line retailer.
