The Ansonia Peep O' Day Alarm Clock Ca 1877

As many of us alarm clock collectors know Ansonia Clock Company made countless alarm clocks. Some of which are very common and others are more collectable. One collectable alarm clock from Ansonia has a very special movement call the Peep O' Day movement. As can be seen in one of the following pictures the Peep O' Day's trademark is very distinctly stamped into the case.

This movement was patented on March 27, 1877 by H.J. and W.D. Davies. The patent allowed the movement to have only one spring doing the function of both the time side and the alarm side of the clock. You just wind the one winding key seen on the back and this allowed the clock to keep time and at the designated hour ring the alarm.

The following are a couple of possible reasons that this movement is called the Peep O' Day by the owners of the Ansonia Clock Company.

The first idea comes from a fellow Davies collector. He states: "...that the Merchant Princes of the time were known as Peep O' Days because of their interest in shipping.... Peep O' Day means, of course, the very first light of day. William Dodge is the definition of a "Merchant Prince". Both the father and the son were the key partners in Phelps & Dodge Company. This is the company that owned the Ansonia Brass and Copper Company and the Ansonia Clock Company. I think they also hired Peep O' Day boys to keep track of shipping for them, as fortunes could be made by both knowing what a ship was carrying and being the first to buy its cargo.

The first mention of Peep O' Day boys as I recall was with Anson Phelps out in the early morning watching for ships arriving in New York through the Hudson River..."

Another idea associated with the name Peep O' Day could be from an alarm clock collector that knows of a "rumor"The Peep O' Day alarm clock in this article is his. His thought was that the center of the dial of his Peep O' Day appears to be a view through a telescope of what he would like to think was the Hudson River. Several years ago another NAWCC member suggested the term "Peep O' Day" came from lookouts waiting for ships to come into sight so they could alert the local community that the ship was arriving with supplies.

Believe what you may as to which explanation is the correct one. I, personally, do not think that either is correct but actually both seem to have similarities that lead me to believe what I say many times:

"There's always a little truth in everything."

Just enjoy the pictures of a great alarm clock And the stories that are associated with it.








A close up of the Peep-O-Day dial

More Rare Alarm Clocks From "Alarm Clock Peter"

I believe that Alarm Clock Peter is probably not just one of the biggest collectors of German alarm clocks in Germany but probably the biggest collector.

He is always on the hunt for unusual alarm clocks even planning his trips and vacations in areas that he knows will have flea markets and antique shows where the unusual show up. As we have shown in past HBACC Newsletter we see that his level of collecting far surpasses many of the alarm clock collectors that I know. From the simple, but unusual, alarm clock to some that have multiple bells or animation of the strikers.

He recently shared with me photos of extremely rare German animated alarm clocks. These were not just the "run of the mill" alarm clocks but a specific of alarm clocks that are highly collectible both with clock collectors and other collectors.

We here in the United State refer to this collectable as "Black Americana". Clocks that were made back in the early 1900's but would never be made today for obvious reasons. That being said, many people still collect Black Americana items today because of their rarity of the items and to show what the mindset was in the early part of the 1900's.

The following alarm clocks are prized by many and very collectable.











A Westclox Alarm with a Pasted Over Dial

Our Treasurer / Secretary Mike Wilson has sent me pictures of a recent acquisition he made. The Clock measures 5 inches wide by 4 ¾ inches high and from the shape is surely a Style 8 Westclox Big Ben alarm clock from the late 1960's or sometime in the 1970's. The dial has a pasted over label with the image of a Harley Davidson motorcycle. It also clear that the case has been repainted (see image on next page.

The question to ask is just who was it that made the alterations. Was it done by Harley Davidson (it is hard to believe a corporation this large would have done it)

or maybe one of its Distributors?

In any case this is an unusual find and I thank Mike for sharing it with us.
