It is these hard working women (the first watch and clock chapter Auxiliary formed in the N.A.W.C.C.) that have supplied your Editor with all these news items. And there are many more things to come so don't put this Issue of the H.O.A. Report down yet.

October 9th H.O.A. Meeting was another first for our H.O.A. Chapter. The Program for this Meeting was presented by one of the young ladies of our Auxiliary and was an outstanding development of the Ansonia Clock Company. This particular member is no

ordinary Auxiliary member—she is an authority on clocks of all kinds and probably one of the only members of H.O.A. who could have developed this particular subject so well. She was none other than Mrs. Marcia Bruer, the wife of our first H.O.A. President.

The Ansonia Brass and Copper Company instigated the Ansonia Clock Co. in 1841 under the leadership of Phillips with the sole purpose of selling more brass. Original home was Ansonia, Conn., but in 1878 the factory was moved to Brooklyn, N. Y. This was the period in which brass springs were being introduced and Ansonia successfully pushed their brass into every conceivable novality type of clock, some which have become rather famous collector's items such as the Cupid Alarm (1882), the Swinging Ball Clock (1889), the Gravity Clock (1923), followed by the Plate Clock, the many many varieties of annimated alarms, and even later, striking alarms. This is one of the few companies still in business today. At the present writing of this Report, the entire talk given by Mrs. Bruer is being prepared for press by our present President, Dr. Knauf, and we are anxiously awaiting the time when we can reprint it for all our members to enjoy. Information regarding the Ansonia Clock Company is really hard to find so this will be a worthwhile project when completed.

EDITORIAL by your Editor who would welcome some comments on the views expressed:

We were honored by a recent visit to our Chapter by our National N.A.W.C.C. President, Mr. and Mrs. William Wadleigh, who was visiting the "grass roots" of our great national organization. His visit was indeed timely and informative, and our sincere thanks go out to Mr. and Mrs. Caspar A. Wagner who so generously provided their home for the get-to-gether that evening as was announced in the October Issue of the Report Mr. Wadleigh provided us with a very informative evening of slides of rare clocks he has either had, does have, or has seen. Hisdevelopment of these unusual clocks was unique as well as interesting, and was climaxed by several close-ups of rare wagon springs. It was indeed a very educational evening as well as an evening for collector to dream on. And that is where my problem is centered.

Your Editor has had the pleasure of only one National N.A.W.C.C. Convention, but the "key-note" address that night defined clock and watch collectors as "specialist"—no, rather, he used the term "experts" in our fields; During Mr. Wadleigh's visit to our H.O.A. Land, he stressed "up-grading" our collections by selling lesser clocks to pay for more valuable clocks. Conceiveably, some of our finest collections could then only consist of not more than twelve or so clocks...rarest unusual clocks. True, undoubtedly, this type of collector has deeply studied his clocks, but is he a collector or a student of clocks or watches??? To study a subject to its infintestimal length does not make one a collector; rather, he becomes an authority. Are we collectors or students of clocks—that is the question and one that your Editor feels should be decided so that distinguishment can be made. Our National Association needs to take this into consideration. When one wishes to see a collection, he should be able to identify WHO is a collector. When one needs advice or information, he should be able to locate those WHO are authorities. How do we solve this delima? Can someone help??
