O Tech Topics:

Ormolu is an English term, used since the 18th century for the gilding technique of applying a finely ground, high-carat Gold–Mercury amalgam to an object to achieve a tarnish resistant surface finish.

Please visit our Chapter web page: https://new.nawcc.org/index.php/chapter-53-inland-empire The mercury is driven off in a kiln leaving behind a gold coating achieving a bright gold finish. The same process has also been applied to Copper, Zinc and Bronze.

Oil The general definition of **Oil** is any nonpolar chemical liquid of high Carbon and Hydrogen content. This is rather broad as there are numerous sources and applications. Sources of an Oil may be animal, vegetable, or petrochemical and may be either volatile or nonvolatile. They are used for foods, fuel such as heating oil, medical purposes (e.g., mineral oil), lubrication and a base stock for the manufacture of many types of paints, plastics, and other materials. Specially prepared oils are used in some religious ceremonies and rituals as purifying agents. For lubrication, given that they are nonpolar, oils do not easily adhere to other substances. This makes them useful as lubricants for various engineering purposes. Traditionally, mineral oils have been more commonly used as machine lubricants than animal or vegetable oils. In earlier years, Whale oil was preferred for lubricating clocks, because it does not evaporate quickly, leaving a residue, although its use was banned in the USA in 1980.
